A last opportunity is offered them to wipe out the disgrave and escape the punishment of their grimes. By authority of the President of the Confederate States, a pardon is announced to such deserters and men improperly absent, as shall return to the commands to which they belong within the shortest possible time, not exceeding twenty days from the publication of this order, at the headquarters of the

department in which they may be.

These who may be presented by interruption of communications, may report within the time specified to the nearest enrolling officer or other officer on duty, to a forwarded as seon as prasticable, and upon presenting certificate from such officer chewing compliance with this requirement, will receive the pardon hereby offered. Those who have deserted to the service of theenemy or who have deserted after having been ones pardoned for the same offence, and these who shall detect, or obsent themselves without authorily after the sublication of this order, are excluded from its benefits. Nor does the offer of parton extend to other offences than de-

sertion and absence without permission

By thousms entherity, it is also declared that no general amnesty will again be granted, and those who refuse such punishment as the Courts may impose, and no ap-

mies intend for us, let every man devote all his energies to the common defeace. The adventages of the enemy will have but little value if we do not permit them to impair our resolution. CHRONOLOGICAL AGE OF THE WORLD. In the Old Chronicle of Egypt there is a period of four hundred and forty three years of a cynic or four hundred and forty three years of a cysic cycle, containing fifteen generations, which precedes the record of the historic kings of Egypt. A new calendar was then adopted, B. C. 1986, as is shown by the fellowing calculations; and a sothic cycle then began, which ended in the year B. C. 525, when Cambyses, the Perdan, conquered Egypt, fourteen hundred and sixty-one Egyptian years later than B. C. 1986. The statement that years later than B. C. 1986. The statement that a sothic cycle ended in the year B. C. 525 has been doubted, because it has been assumed that a sothic cycle could only begin when First Throth, the new year's day of the Egyptians, coincided with the helicoal rising of the star Sirius, and therefore the sothic cycle of the star Sirius, and therefore the sothic cycle of the Old Chonicle must have commenced on the 20th of July, B. C. 1822; but Mr. Osburn, in his Monumental History of Egypt, has shown that, at the heginning of the

of Egypt, has shown that, at the beginning of the Byptime who has, First Throth was the day of the full meen after the star Sirius appeared in the evening, after the setting of the sun; and by calculation, it is certain that such a coincidence happened in the month of December, B. C. 19°6. By using the lunt solar cycle of seven hundred years, composed by multiplying the solar cycle of twenty-eight years by the lunar cycle of twenty-

five years, the period of four hundred and fortythree years is thus explained: From the sum of three luni solar cycles of seven hundred years Deduct the years of the world from the

ereation of Adam to the end of the Deluge, 1,657 years;

The remainder is the period found in the Old Chroniala These dates and periods produce a remarkable agreement with the Bible Chronology, as contained in Brown's Ordo Saclorum, which dates the creation of Adam B C. 4102, and the beginning of the Deluge D. C. 2446.

Mixraim, father of the Egyptians, B C. 2,429 years, or sixteen years after the deluge had ended. The year of the world, at the end of three luni olar eycles of seven hundred years each, is equal to B. C. 2,002, sixteen years prior to B C. 1986; but Ptolemy, of Mendes, having expressly stated that the Old Chronicle began with the seventeenth year of Adam, the difference is at once

accounted for. But the Old Chronicle is composed of twenty. five cycles of fourteen hundred and sixty one years each, equal to thirty-six thousand, five hundred and twenty five years, of which twenty-one cycles are given to the gods and four cycles to the human race, down to Cambyses. Various attempts have been made to reconcile these enormous periods with the truth, principally by con-sidering the years to be lunar instead of solar, but

without any accurate result. The following solution brings the Old Chronicle and the Hebrew Bible into exact agreement: When the Egyptians adopted the calendar, and gave names to the months corresponding to the seasons, they commenced the fourth cycle of seven hundred years, which cycle was, in later times, extended to one thousand four hundred and sixtyone years, and was called a soshio cycle. Hence. when the Old Chronicle was written, it was known that the history of the world was contained in four cycles; but, being desirous of making Egypt the oldest country of the world, the four cycles were each made to consist of one thousand, four hundred and sixty-one years To bring it back to the truth, it is only necessary to reject the

There are no property considerations, which rationally interfere with the destruction of cotton

that cannot be removed. It is as much destroyed

to the owner when it falls within the reach of the yankees, as if it had been given to the flames. Lincoln's necessities make him rapacious for cot. ton. Even that which belonged to foreigners at Savannah was seized like the rest, without hesitation or scruple. When cotton cannot be removed within our lines, the only question is, shall we leave it for the benefit of our enemies, or shall we burn it? To ask the question is to answer it. But it is necessary to be deeply in earnest in this matter. We must make it a cardinal policy, and we must sacrifice delinquents promptly and sternly, until it is diligently and faithfully exeouted
