HEADQR'S ARMIES OF THE C. STATES,] 11th February, 1865 GENERAL ORDERS. No. 2.

In entering upon the campaign about to open, the General-in-Chief feels assured that the soldiers who have so long and so nobly borne the hardships and dangers of the war, require no ex-hortation to respond to the calls of honor and duty. With the liberty transmitted by their forefath ers they have inherited the spirit to defend it. The choice between war and abject submission is before them. To such a proposal brave men with arms in their hands can have but one answer. They cannot barter manhood for peace, nor the

right of self-government for life or property. But justice to them requires a sterner admoni-tion to those who have abandoned their comrader in the hour of peril. A last opportunity is offered them to wipe cat the disgrace and escape the punishment of their crimes. By authority of the President of the Confederate States, a pardon is encoursed to such deserters and men improperly absent, as shall return to the commands to which they belong within the shortest possible time, not exceeding twenty days from the publication of this order; at the headquarters of the department in which they may be.

Those who may be prevented by interruption of communications, may report within the time specified to the nearest enrolling officer or other officer on duty, to be forwarded as son as practicable, and upon presenting a certificate from such officer showing compliance with this requirement, will receive the pardon hereby offered. Those who have described to the service of the energy. Those who have described to the service of the energy. or who have described after having been once pardoned for the same offence, and those who shall describe or ab-sent themselves without authority after the publication of this order, are excluded from its benefits. Nor does the offer of pardon extend to other offences than de sertion and absence without permission. By the same authority, it is also declared that no gene-

ral amnesty will again be granted, and those who refuse to accept the pardou now offered, or who shall hereafter desert or absent themselves without leave, shall suffer such punishment as the Courts may impose, and no aplication for elemency will be entertained.

Taking new resolution from the fate which our ene nries intend for us. let every man devote all his ener gies to the common defence. Our resources, wisely and vigorously employed, are smrle, and with a brave army, sustained by a determined and united people; success, with God's assistance, cannot be doubtful. The advantages of the enemy will have but little value if we advantages of the enemy will have but lists value is we do not permit them to impair our resolution Let us, then, oppose constancy to adversity, fortitude to suffer-ing and courage to danger, with the firm assurance that He who gave freadom to our fathers will bless the ef-forts of their children to preserve it. A REMARK BLB DAN ER.

Donato, the one-legged dancer, is attracting much attention in London, and a paper there thus describes his feats:

"When Senor Donsto first presents himself, hopping on from the side scenes, no pleasurable smotion is felt; on the contrary, the immediate feeling rather partakes of the disagreeable. To see a map in the very prime of life, with one leg and stump without support, coming forward, sui-ling and proffering to do is a state of mutilation what fow male dancers, perfect and whole, of the greatest art and experience, over could do-mame. ly, afford unqualified graufication-seems to shock re's delicecy, no less than mock his credulity. Senor Donato, however, eplists your sympathics pretty well before you have finished inspecting nim. By his extraordinary bounds and pircuettes on his entrance, he fixes your attention in a mement, and you are autonished at bebo'ding a dan. member say professor of the Terpsishorean art having secomplished on two legs. Nor when as, tonishment has passed off is your interest in Senor Donato exhausted. On the contrary, you see something to be pleased with in his performance every moment, until at last you acknowledge that he is not only one of the most surprising dancer-you ever beheld, but one the most engaging; and uch is the case.

A person may smile at hearing the word graceful' used in speaking of a one-legged dancer, out if ever the term were applicatie to a male Ternsichorean artist, it is to Senor Donato, whose notions, actions, gestures and general d portment are instinct with that natural ease and propriety which are the essentials of grace. In short, the fact of Senor Donato having but one leg is soon forgotten by the spectators, and their sympathies are enchained in following his marvellous feats of agility and science; and these are by no means easy to describe. Senor Donato enters bounding on the stage to the tune of some Spanish dance. He accompanies the tune with the castanets, which he plays with more consummate skill than any one we ever heard. This may be a tr fle. but it is a great gain for him

His pirouettes are made with incomparable ease, and the dexterous manner in which he swings his body round, performing two revolu. tions, is beyond all belief. Among the most difficult feats he performs is placing a costanct on the ground with his right hand, at right angles to his body, and taking it up with his left hand without bending his leg all the time. The prac. titioners in gymnastics will understand the diff. oulty of achieving this feat standing on two legs. That part of Senor Donato's performance, how. ever, which engages most attention and creates the greatest excitement, is the cloak dance. How the dancer flings the cloak around him, making it assume all sorts of fanciful shapesnow clothing his body, with it, transforming it. as it were, into a sca shell; now waving the mantle over him like a banner; and now changing it into a floating cloudland, making it descend like a mist around him-must be seen to he understood.
