WHEREAS William Hill, Esq; Attorney of the United States in and for the District of North-Carolina, has this eighteenth day of June, in the year of American independence the fifteenth, exhibited a libel in the Court of the United States for the District of North-Carolina, against a phaeton and part of a set of harness, seized by the surveyor of the Port of Wilmington in the District aforesaid, on the thirteenth day of July last past for having been imported into the United States, in the brig Faulkner, Michael Faulkner, master, from the island of St. Christopher's last, within the dominions of the King of Great-Britain, and not having been included in the manifest delivered by the said master to the Collector of the said Port, and the duties not having been paid or secured to be paid thereon agreeable to the statutes of the Congress of the United States: and praying this Court to consider thereof and condemn the same:

This is therefore to notice all persons whom it may concern, that the Honorable JOHN SITGREAVES, Esquire, Judge of the District Court of the United States for North-Carolina District, has directed a Court to be held at Newbern, on the sixth day of July next, when the consideration of the libel exhibited as aforesaid will be had, and all persons having claim to the articles libelled, or concerned therein are hereby cited and admonished to appear, on the sixth day of July aforesaid, at the Court aforesaid, and shew cause, if any they have, why the prayer of the libel may not be granted, and the articles condemned.
