This is therefore to notice all persons whom it may concern, that the Honorable IOHN SITGREAVES, Esquire, Judge of the Diftrict Court of the United States for North-Carolina District, has directed a Court to be held at Newbern, on the fixth day of July next, when the confideration of the libel exhibited as aforesaid will be had, and all persons have ing claim to the articles libelled, or concerned therein are hereby cited and admonished to appear, on the fixth day of July aforefaid, at the Court aforesaid, and shew cause, if any they have, why the prayer of the libel may not be granted, and the articles condemned.
