THE publication of a Revival of the public laws of this State, by Judge Iredell, having seemingly, superseded the necessity of preserving the pamphlets published at the rise of each session of the Legislature, these are now looked upon as mere lumber, and in a few years will probably cease to be extant. It is in the records of the Secretary's Office (if the records of the Secretary's Office are excepted) that are contained a number of Acts, which tho' called private, are of momentous utility to many of the inhabitants of this State, and may eventually become so to all of them. These were not included in the Judge's revival; and the difficulty of finding a number of them is already extreme, and without a republication, will soon ripen into an absolute impracticability.

Under these impressions, F. X. Martin has undertaken to collect and reprint them and will furnish a well bound copy of his collection to any gentleman who may wish to honor the undertaking with his patronage.

LONDON, October 10.

LORD Hood, in his first proclamation to the Toulonese, made no mention of the Constitution of 1789, wishing no doubt to avoid representing the British Ministry as inconsistent with themselves, and to direct contradiction to the views of their Allies. The caution, however, soon forsook him. In his second proclamation he declares for the restoration of the Constitution of 1789, and announces that the proclamation had produced a very happy effect—that is to say, is quieted the scruples of such of the inhabitants of Toulon as could not agree to betray their country, but who, provided France was independent and free, were indifferent as to the form of its government. It remains to be seen, whether as a ministerial paper of the best authority has assured us, the profligate system now adopted be to hold out the restoration of the old Despotism to one set of Frenchmen, the restoration of the Constitution of 1789 to another, and when both shall have been duped by our professions, to keep faith with neither.

The value of the cannon, ammunition, and baggage, left near Dunkirk, on the 7th instant, added to the payment to be made for the unfortunate Hanoverians who fell on the same day, will amount, it is said, to 200,000l.

The Elector of Mentz pays a million of florins to the King of Prussia, towards the heavy expence of regaining his capital.

Wonderful Dog—Mr. Donnelly of Covent-Garden has a fine Spaniel Dog, that regularly goes to Clare-market, to purchase his dinner. His master gives him a sixpence and with this he proceeds to market, and searches every butcher's shop, lights, coarse beef or tripe. When he meets with either that he approves, he lays down the money and returns with the change and dinner to his master. If he is defrauded, which is never the case except for the amusement of the butcher, he goes home and returns and fixes on the butcher for his keeper. His custom is solicited as regularly as any gentleman that frequents the market, but he cannot be induced to deal with those who have not what immediately suits his palate. There are other stories told of this animal, equally extraordinary as the above.

The success of the Exchequer Bill Act has been complete. The first instalment, being one fourth of the whole sum advanced, was repaid to the Exchequer even before the day
