## GENOA, November 4.

UR Republic is in a more critical state I than it has been in for half a century. The commanders of the British and Spanish fquadrons in our port, which were reenforced last week by several ships of the line, frigates, and cutters, perfift in urging the Senate, even by threats, to join the powers combined against France; there is, however, at Genoa, a very numerous party, which opposes this coalition, and is even in favour of the Convention. Those who belong to this party are accused of the most finister defigns; and the Government has ordered public prayers for three days, which ended on Wednesday last, to prescree the State from the dangers which threatened it.

This relates to the discovery of a Cataline conspiracy, encompassed by a set of men, waro, favoured by feditious anarchy, flattered themselves to turn the general coususon to their own profit. One of those confpirators has been arrefled at Pozzuolo, among whose papers were found the names of all the accomplices in this conspiracy, or thole at least who were to have a share in it, and whose number exceeds 3000. The faid papers alfo contain their defigns, and the expenses which they had already incurred, or were farther to incur, to obtain adherents and abettors.

The chief of the conspiracy is also said to be in custody; he is a Roman by birth, of the name of Poli, and was in the fervice of Mr. Tilly, the resident Minister of the Convention. It is also faid, that in the note feized upon this chief, there are the names of 14 young patricians, who have al-

ready left Genoa. The plan of the conspirators was to fet fire to Porto-Franco, and to the hospital of the poor; and while every body would be bufy in extinguishing the flames, 600 of the conspirators were to go to the Bank of St. George, to plunder the treasure; 300 more were to make themselves masters of the fort and of the battery of St. Benigno; 250 of the battery of Della Cava; 250 of the battery called La Stria; and 200 of the arfenal and the Palace. The rest of the conspirators were to patrol the city, to plunder, and to fpread consternation. We will not vouch for the truth of thefe reports.

Nov. 9. Our Senate feems to wish to preferve the neutrality. Foreseeing that this harbour and the other ports of Genoa well blockaded, the Council has taken the greatest precautions. At the same time all the Genoele merchantmen are forbidden to leave

## L.EGHORN, November 6.

We learn from Corfica, that the Royalist party, with General Paoli at their head, gain ground on the conventional party (which is the least numerous) in that Island, daily. The latter, after various defeats, have lost several towns and a number of important posts. A commissioner from the Convention, and lome other republicans, liave been taken by the English sleet, in the Gelph of St. Laurence, and fent to Corto.
