THE publication of a Revision of the pub-
lic laws of this State, by Judge Iredell,
having seemingly superseeded the necessity of
preserving the pamphlets published at the
rise of each session of the Legislature, these
are now looked upon as useless lumber, and
in a few years will probably cease to be ex-
tant. It is in them alone (if the records of
the Secretary's Office are excepted) that
are contained a number of Acts, which tho'
called private, are of momentous utility to
many of the inhabitants of this State, and
may eventually become so to all of them.
These were not included in the Judge's revi-
sion; and the difficulty of finding a number of
them is already extreme, and without a re-
publication, will soon ripen into an absolute
impracticability.

Under these impressions, F. X. Martin
has undertaken to collect and reprint them

GENOA, November 4.

OUR Republic is in a more critical state
than it has been in for half a century.
The commanders of the British and Spanish
squadrons in our port, which were reen-
forced last week by several ships of the line,
frigates, and cutters, persist in urging the
Senate, even by threats, to join the powers
combined against France; there is, howe-
ver, at Genoa, a very numerous party,
which opposes this coalition, and is
even in favour of the Convention. Those
who belong to this party are accused of the
most sinister designs; and the Government
has ordered public prayers for three days,
which ended on Wednesday last, to pre-
serve the State from the dangers which
threatened it.

This relates to the discovery of a Cataline
conspiracy, encompassed by a set of men,
who, favoured by seditious anarchy, flatter-
ed themselves to turn the general confu-
sion to their own profit. One of those con-
spirators has been arrested at Pozzuolo, a-
mong whose papers were found the names
of all the accomplices in this conspiracy, or
those at least who were to have a share in it,
and whose number exceeds 3000. The
said papers also contain their designs, and
the expenses which they had already incur-
red, or were farther to incur, to obtain ad-
herents and abettors.

The chief of the conspiracy is also said to
be in custody; he is a Roman by birth, of
the name of Poli, and was in the service of
Mr. Tilly, the resident Minister of the
Convention. It is also said, that in the
note seized upon this chief, there are the
names of 14 young patricians, who have al-
ready left Genoa.

The plan of the conspirators was to set
fire to Porto-Franco, and to the hospital of
the poor; and while every body would be
busy in extinguishing the flames, 600 of the
conspirators were to go to the Bank of St.
George, to plunder the treasure; 300
more were to make themselves masters of
the fort and of the battery of St. Benig-
no; 250 of the battery of Della Cava;
250 of the battery called La Stria;
and 200 of the arsenal and the Palace. The
rest of the conspirators were to patrol the
city, to plunder, and to spread confutati-
on. We will not vouch for the truth of
these reports.

Nov. 9. Our Senate seems to wish to pre-
serve the neutrality. Foreseeing that this
harbour and the other ports of Genoa well
blockaded, the Council has taken the greatest
precautions. At the same time all the Ge-
noese merchantmen are forbidden to leave
port.

The French are still in our territory, but
at night they sleep on board their ships. Ci-
tizen Tilly, the French Minister, still re-
mains here.

LEGHORN, November 6.

We learn from Corsica, that the Royalist
party, with General Paoli at their head,
gain ground on the conventional party
(which is the least numerous) in that Island,
daily. The latter, after various defeats,
have lost several towns and a number of
important posts. A commissioner from the
Convention, and some other republicans,
have been taken by the English fleet, in the
Gulf of St. Laurence, and sent to Corto.
