Extract of a letter from the frontiers of Po-

" HE patriots on the 17th inft. after having rendered themselves masters of the grand artenal at Warlaw, obliged the Ruffiangarrison, confifting of 3000 troops to evacuate the town. Baron Igelstrohm, the Russian ambassador, was obliged to take refuge with the Prussian army under General Wolkey, encamped a league's distance from that capital. His majesty the King of Poland is retained as an hostage by the patriots. Some reports state, that his majesty escaped to a convent, escorted by 300 Russians. The ambassador of a neighbouring power (probably the Ruffian) has also been retained as an hoftage. . The infurgents have established a revolutionary tribunal, and feveral persons are said to have already fuffered by the rope.

" General Koscitiki is very active in forfifying the town of Cracow. He ordered a declaration to be published, by which those citizens who do not wish to remain in the town, in case of a siege, are permitted to quit in eight days time; in confequence of which declaration, a great number of rich merchants, with their goods, tog ether
