have had credible Information from the Mohawks, that the French are now gone from Canada with an Army of 60 Men, 400 French and 200 Indians (intending to augment their Army, to a 1000, as they go along) into the South-Part of North-America, in order to strengthen their own Interest, and ruin ours in those Parts; particularly to destroy the Nation of the Tawwachawees, that are very friendly to the English; and to kill a certain Virginia Trader, who, by his Dealings with the Indians, has lately gain'd the Affection of many, and greatly drawn their Trade that Way; and that C. J. having had Intelligence of this by a Frenchman who deserted from the Army, and by various other Ways, had sent a Bell of Wampum to all the Six Nations, to give them Notice of it, and to excite them to oppose the Design of this Army.

HN's in Antigua, September 13.

On Sunday the 8th Instant, we had the most violent Hurricane that has been known here in the Memory of the oldest Man, which began at N. W. between 6 and 7 o'Clock in the Evening, and continued to blow (thifting gradually a Point or two to the Southward or East) with the most shocking Intensity, till four o'Clock in the Morning. The Damage sustained in Town is great, but trifling compared to the Losses they have received in all Parts of the County.

The Captain, Samuel Noldred, Master, belonging to the Ship, and bound to this Island, founder'd on Sunday Morning, at 60 Leagues to Windward of this Island, having two of his Men washed over board. He and his People were rescued next Day by Capt. Elwell, in the Schooner Phoenix, from Cape Anne, who arrived here Yesterday. It is reported, that Capt. Noldred had a Storm near 24 Hours longer than us; for, the Height of the Gale, he says, was between 2 o'Clock on Saturday Night, and 2 in the Morning.

Speedwell, Dedman, Salem, will get off. Sp. R. Douglas, Antigua, will get off. Sp. Barb, Pat. L., Barbados, got off. Sp. Prudent Mary, Huddell, Antigua, left. Sp. Samiel, Antigua, got off. Sp. Purcell, Brookes, Antigua, will get off. Sp. Anne, Green, Antigua, will get off. Sp. Elizabeth, Capman, Montserrat, got off. Sloop-Richardson, Bermud, will get off. Two Shallops, Montserrat, will get off. Also 22 Shallops and Two Mast Boats put ashore, and most of which will be got off.

Capt. Lee, in the Iron, all the Iron, but will get off. The Sloop-Jack, and two Sloops belonging to Major Vickery, are ashore, and will also be got off.

The Brig William, from New London, at Wilmoughby-Bay, is lost. A Sloop belonging to St. Helena, drove ashore at Green-Island, the people supposed to be lost. A Sloop of 40 Tons, of the name of the King, and 7 or 8 dead Bodies drove ashore. A Sloop belonging to Major Hamilton, and a Ship belonging to Nantux, lost.

The Glasgow and Shark Men of War, were both ashore at English-Harbour, but are got off.

Capt. Bedford, who arrived Yesterday from Barbados, informs us, that he had the Gale of Wind off of Martinico, but not with so much Severity as to hinder them to carry Sail; and a Vessel arrived from Boston, which was three Degrees to the Northward of this Island when the Storm happened, had it all moderately: But we are in Pain for Montserrat, St. Kitts, and the other Leeward-Islands, which seldom escape such severe Hurricanes without great Loss.
