### LATE GENERAL NEWS.

**DEKALB, September 12.**  
Verdict in the Chisholm case in Mississippi proves beyond doubt that a Democrat cannot be convicted in the south for the murder of a Republican.

The total vote of Maine, it is estimated, will reach 129,000. Republican gain over last year as far as returned 12,619. Davis, Republican, probably takes 650 to 600 votes of a majority overall, but will of course be elected by the legislature.

Gov. Chester A. Arthur, the former collector of New York, has been made chairman of the New York Republican State Committee.

The President has made a pleasant perch to the Cincinnati Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Everett has for a week been in Canada, the guest of the Governor General and the Princess Louise.

Hon. John Welsh of Philadelphia, late minister to the Court of St. James, has been tendered a public reception in the old Independence Hall.

The yellow fever closed at Memphis on Friday with 21 new cases. No increase in New Orleans nor anywhere else. Jay Gould has sent another check of \$500,000 to the President of the Howard Association, and the citizens of Pittsburg, Penn., \$1,000.

Ex-Gov. Hoffman has deserted Tammany and will support Robinson.

At Athens, Ala., a mob of 3,000 broke into the jail and took out a man who had been sentenced to be hung for murdering his wife, to lynch him, but when they got ready a body would be the rope and the whole crowd stampeded.

The Republicans of Maryland have nominated the following ticket: For Governor, James A. Gary, of Howard county, by acclamation; for Comptroller, Samuel Mellham, of Queen Anne's; for Attorney General, Francis M. Darby, of Washington; for Clerk of the Court of Appeals, James McCullough, of Cecil county.

The Democratic state convention of Wisconsin has nominated Alex. Mitchell of Milwaukee for Governor; Geo. H. King for Lt. Governor; and Samuel Ryan for Secretary of State.

The reports in regard to the cotton crop from the states of North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana are, that cotton has been injured about 20 per cent by the wet weather.

The Wilmington Star of a few weeks ago, having proved that Daniel Webster was an ardent secessionist, has now discovered that the people of the north are vastly more "ignorant" than those of the south. Both of these propositions having been conclusively demonstrated, we understand that next week the Star will demonstrate that America is of a higher order of civilization than France, and England more "ignorant" than Bulgaria.

Gen. J. B. Hood became impoverished in consequence of the repudiation of the state debt by the Democrats of Louisiana. It is met that his orphan child, now also impoverished, should not therefore be left in want.

The Hon. John B. French, recently brought at Arms of the Senate, is spoken of as one of the Commissioners of the District of Columbia.

There has been an outbreak in Afghanistan and the British envoy and suite have been murdered. There is an attempt to incite a general revolt.

The President, Gen. W. T. Sherman, and Attorney General Devens, have gone to Ohio.

Mrs. Kate Chase Sprague, through her attorney Mr. Charles H. Partridge, has filed a petition in the Supreme Court of Rhode Island asking the appointment of a trustee or trustees to take charge of her property, and alleging that her husband, William Sprague, and herself are not now living together as husband and wife.

Alexander H. Stevens of Georgia says he doesn't think much of Uncle Sam's Tilden, and prefers Gen. Hancock as the Democratic candidate for President.

### NEW YORK DEMOCRACY.

**Tammany Bolts and Nominates John Kelly.**  
The New York Democratic convention which met at Syracuse on Thursday, nominated the following ticket:—Lucius Robinson (the present Gov.) for Governor; Clarkson N. Potter, for Lt. Governor; Allen C. Beach, for Secretary of State; Thomas W. Alcott for Comptroller; James Mackin, for Treasurer; and A. Schoonmaker, for Attorney General.

On the nomination of Robinson the Tammany delegates withdrew in a body, and organized a convention in another hall, and nominated for Governor John Kelly of New York city, the Schemer of Tammany. They also appointed a committee authorized to designate the rest of the ticket.

This is a success for the Tilden wing of the party.

Mr. Courtney who presided over the Tammany bolters made a very severe speech against Robinson, denouncing him as being "swayed by the great tricksters of Cripple Alley." David Dudley Field also made a speech against Robinson.

**JUSTICE GRADY.**  
Owing to additional information we have received concerning this law officer, we again refer to him.

It will be remembered by our readers that some months ago we published the facts concerning a young man of the city, sent to jail for non-payment of a debt, afterwards he became the complainant and told the court to discharge the boy, and told the fact that he did not want the case to go before the Criminal Court—being afraid of the result and a full exposure. We also informed our readers of the murder of a man by the name of Jones, while the constable and another man were trying to arrest one Randall Jordan, whom the justice was anxious to send to jail, in order that he might get his costs in a former case he had tried against Jordan. We are now reliably informed that Randall Jordan is the step-father of the boy named Justice Grady had before him, and when he was forced to turn loose, owing to the fact that Randall Jordan and his wife employed Mr. Bellamy, which forced the boy's dismissal. This on the part of Jordan, made Justice Grady very mad. He found out that some six months previous another small boy had been slapped in the face by Jordan, while they were at work together in a field. Justice Grady sent after this boy, and told him if he did not take out a warrant for Jordan, that he (Grady) would fine him (the boy). So the warrant was issued, and Jordan was tried by his enemy, Grady, and sentenced to pay the costs. Jordan could not pay it and was ordered to jail. This vengeance on the part of Grady, caused poor Jones to lose his life. The constable let Jordan remain at French's rock quarry a Rocky Point, for three months before arresting him. He knew, we understand, that he was there, but he said, "wait until after my trial for the killing of Jones."

We state these matters, so that our readers can get what amount of bad blood is used by a man occupying the position of a Justice of Peace, and who uses his official position to wreak vengeance on a poor defenceless colored man. *Hon. member.*

Devaux, Commissioner appointed by said decree, will sell by public auction, in the City of Wilmington, of the state of North Carolina, on WEDNESDAY, THE FIRST DAY OF OCTOBER, A.
