

State Republican Plan of Organization.

Rules and Regulations for the Organization of the Republican Party of North Carolina.

I. County Organization.—The election precinct shall be the unit of county organization. Each precinct shall have an executive committee...

II. Congressional, Judicial and Senatorial Districts.—There shall be a Congressional, Judicial and Senatorial District Committee, composed of not less than one member from each county...

III. State Executive Committee.—There shall be a State Executive Committee, composed of one member from each Congressional District in the state...

IV. The chairmen of the respective county, district and state executive committees shall call their conventions to order and act as temporary chairmen until a permanent organization is effected...

V. No executive committee shall have power to elect or appoint delegates to any convention, whether county, district, state or national.

VI. No member of an executive committee or delegates or alternates duly chosen shall have power to delegate his trust or authority to another.

VII. Representation.—Representation in county conventions shall consist of three Republican voters as delegates, and three as alternates from each precinct in the county, and no more.

VIII. Representation in congressional, judicial, senatorial and state conventions, shall consist of two delegates and two alternates and two alternates only, for every member of the Lower House of the General Assembly...

IX. Delegates and alternates to county conventions shall be elected only by a vote of the Republicans of each precinct in precinct meeting assembled, and delegates and alternates to district, state and national conventions shall be elected by a convention of delegates duly elected and sent by the people...

X. The certificate of the chairman and secretary of the meeting setting forth the regularity of the primary meeting, or convention, and the election of the delegate and alternate thereat, shall be accepted, when uncontested, as good and sufficient credentials for such delegate and alternate.

XI. This plan of organization and procedure shall continue in force until changed or abrogated by a subsequent Republican state convention, July 8, 1886.
