On Friday morning the usual formularies of getting ready to adjourn sine die were gone through with. The President had no more communications to make.

The chairman of the committee on commerce appointed Messrs. Ransom. Jones of Nevada, Kellogg; Conger and Vest, to inquire into the subject of improving the Kidwell marshes; and that committee will meet in July and report next winter.

The nomination of William E. Chandier as Solicitor Géneral, was rejected by the Senate in executive session on Friday; by a vote of 24 to 19. The Democrats voted solidly against him, and wrre joined by Don Cameron. All the other Republicans voted for him, except Mitchell, of Philadelphia, who withheld his vote.
