This decisi on was rendered in the case of a Chinese actor, who arrived at Portland, Oregon, but was refused permission to land because he had no certificate. Judge Deady, however, decided that he had a right to land on sufficient proof that he was an actor and satisfactory expianation why he had not a ex reificate. - Flechange.
