GRAND LODGE OF MARYLAND.

At a Semi-Annual Grand Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maryland, held in the city of Baltimore on Monday the 6th of November, and continued by adjournment until Tuesday the 7th of November A. D. 1816, among other proceedings, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted.

WHEREAS, it has been represented to the Grand Lodge of Maryland, that the Masonic Hall Lottery, intended to raise funds for the erection of the Masonic Hall in this city, is now drawing; but that the sale of tickets in said Lottery has not been so rapid and successful as could have been wished—whereby the contractors who are principally Masons are likely to encounter loss and damage.

And whereas, it is the duty of all Masons to contribute as far as is practicable, to aid and assist in the disposal or sale of tickets in said Lottery, for the double purpose of accelerating the collection of such monies as are now due or may hereafter be requisite for completion of said Masonic Hall.

And whereas, the example of the Grand Lodge of Maryland may be important in inducing the subordinate Lodges and Brethren generally to exert their utmost endeavors, in forwarding the sale of Tickets, for which the faith of all Brethren was pledged.

Therefore Resolved, That the G. Treasury be authorized to purchase twenty tickets in the Masonic Hall Lottery for the use of the G. Lodge.

Resolved Further, That it be and is now earnestly recommended by the G. Lodge to the subordinate Lodges and Brethren generally, that they proceed without delay to adopt such measures as may seem to them respectively most convenient for aiding the aforesaid contractors in the sale of Tickets not yet disposed of.

Bank of Cape Fear.

In pursuance of a requisition of a competent number of Stockholders in and about Fayetteville agreeably to the charter. I do hereby call a general meeting of the stockholders of the Bank, to be held at the Bank House in Wilmington on Monday the 15th day of April ensuing, at 10 o'clock A. M. for the purpose of taking the following objects into consideration.

1st. That in future no general meeting for other purposes than elections of Directors, shall be legal and binding on the Corporation unless a majority of the Stockholders be present in person or by proxy.

2d. That at general meetings held for the purpose of Electing Directors for the principal Bank, no election with less than a Majority of the whole number of Votes of the stock holders in person or by proxy, shall be legal and binding on this Corporation, until after the expiration of nine days from the first day of the meeting so held, during which nine days it shall be the duty of the Directors holding said election to adjourn it from day to day unless a Majority of votes shall sooner appear.

3d. That in case of the Death, removal, or inability of the President of the principal Bank, the Directors, or a majority of the same shall be authorized to elect a successor who shall hold his office until the succeeding annual election, and be invested with all the powers and authorities, and entitled to the emoluments appertaining to the said office.

4th That the directors of the principal Bank be authorized to appropriate a sum sufficient to the Expense of the Bank Independence, such persons as they may appoint; and generally to make such other resolutions regard to the affairs of this Bank as the Stockholders at such meeting may deem proper.
