Report of State Treasurer.The report of our State Treasurer Hon. David :A. Jenkins, is before us. The entire amount of the special tax and unconstitutional special tax and unconstitutional
bonds, is $\$ 17,881,045$, upon which interest has accrued to the amount of $\$ 5,506,15485$. Of this amount $\$ 3,378,200$, was issued before the war and sold by the State or its agents at par for goid or its equivalent, terest thereon $\$ 2,513,460$, make a total of $\$ 10,891,660$, as ante-bellum debt. This is conceded to be an honest debt of the State as no
charge of improper distribution of the funds arising from the sale of this class of bonds has ever been made. The Treasurer estimates the interest (exclusive of special tax bonds) to be raised $\$ 1,406,66399$ per expenses of running the Government will make $\$ 1,900,000$ per To this amount add taxes for county purposes, and taxes in towns for municipal purposes, and these amounts with what the holders of have a tax requiring 2 and $81-0$ of the real and personal property of the State. The Treasurer thinks the people cannot and will not pay such
a tax. He suggests the issue of new bonds for old bonds in such manmer as the General Assembly deprecates any action looking to detal repudiation. He states that he will resist to the last extremity holders. The report is an able one. Taken altogether the officers of our Treasury Department are gentle-
men of first class abilities. With Hon. David A. Jenkins as Treasurer, D. W. Bain Esq., as chief Teller, the people's money will be well taken care of, and in them the faithful sentinels on their financial watch tower.
