FORTY-FIFTH CONGRESS.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—SENATE.—In the Senate during the morning hour Mr. Anthony submitted a resolution providing that at 1 o'clock Friday 9th, the Senate will proceed to consider the bills on the calendar not objected to, to be discussed under the five minute rule. Agreed to.

Mr. Butler, of S. C., submitted a resolution directing the Secretary of the Interior to inquire and report to the Senate what Railroad company, individual or individuals, are constructing or building a Railroad across the public domain in the territory of Arizona, and by what authority such road is being constructed. Agreed to.

At the conclusion of the morning business Mr. Davis of West Va. called up a resolution submitted by him early in the session, to promote the agricultural interests of the country, and spoke at length upon that subject.

HOUSE.—The House by a vote of yeas 112, nays 105, determined to postpone the Geneva award bill, and is now in committee on a bill for the payment of pensions to the survivors of the Mexican and other wars.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—At a meeting of the House Military Committee this morning the sub-committee reported that the facts in the communications laid before them in regard to the charges against the management of the Soldiers' Home at Hampton were insufficient to warrant Congressional inquiry.

On motion of Representative White, the sub-committee was instructed to examine the matter more fully, and submit their conclusions to the full committee on Thursday.

The Potter Committee to-day examined J. H. Birch, one of the Presidential Electors at large of Louisiana. His testimony was to the effect that he signed the second set of certificates having been advised that there was informality in the first set. He knew nothing of the forgery of the signatures except what he had learned from newspapers and conversations. It was quite true that he forged no signature.

Witness Kelly was re-called from Saturday, and after much pressure stated positively that the name of Jefferson was forged, but was not quite sure as to that of LeVasse. The committee took a recess.

The Senate Finance Committee heard H. W. H. Hunt, President of the Merchants Tobacco Company, of New York and Boston in reply to the House bill which provides for reducing the rate of taxation on tobacco. The committee adjourned without acting on the subject, but will hold a special meeting to dispose of it within the next few days.

The House Committee on Postoffice and Post Roads authorized its chairman (Mr. Waddell) to report the bill prepared by him for the classification of mail matter as a substitute for the bill heretofore reported, and which is now on the calendar.

The House Committee on Commerce agreed to report Mr. Small's bill extending the collection district of Beaufort, S. C., eastward to South Edisto River, so as to include the waters of the Combahee River and the sounds and inlets on the coast between the Edisto and Black River in Georgia.

Affairs on the Isthmus.

PANAMA, Jan. 6.—The revolution was ended in Panama by the peaceful retreat of Corrozo from the presidency of the State. He had become personally unpopular and many of his former friends and supporters deserted him.

A new line of steamers has been inaugurated to run between New Orleans and Baltimore via Celina, Trujillo and Roatan ports on the northern coast of Honduras.

Suspensions.

BOSTON, Jan. 14.—Jenkin Lane & Sons, boots and shoes, are reported to owe from \$200,000 to \$225,000, mostly in New York. The firm has lost heavily from bad debts in the Southern trade; these losses aggregating it is said, \$220,000 in the past four or five years.

LONDON, Jan. 14.—Crighton Brothers, merchants of New Castle on Tyne, have failed. Liabilities £37,500. McKay & Kirkwood, extensive wholesale stationers, printers and publishers of Glasgow have failed. Liabilities large.

Washington Items.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—The Treasury to-day issued a call for twenty millions of \$5.00's; twelve millions registered; eight million coupon bonds. The 4 per cent subscriptions to-day aggregated nearly fourteen millions.

The Cabinet to-day had financial affairs under discussion. Mr. Sherman showed that more gold is coming into the Treasury than going out. Letters from the sub-Treasurers show a popular preference for greenbacks.

One Minute too Late.

MAUCH CHUNG, Jan. 14, 10:40 A. M.—The drop has just fallen and it is feared that the necks of Sharpe and McDowell have been broken. The telegraphic relief has arrived, but one minute too late.

Memphis City Charter.
