Order of Arrest Issued. SARATOGA, N. Y., Jan. 18.—Order of arrest has been issued for J. H. Farrington, Director and business partner of J. S. Leake, Cashier of the First National Bank, on complaint of a woman of whom he obtained a large sum of money a few days ago.

Foreign Items. ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 18.—The Agency Russia says that the proposal to extend the functions of the commission for the organization of Eastern Roumelia has received the assent of all the powers, and that such prolongation does not constitute a violation of the treaty of Berlin.

Italian Affairs. ROME, Jan. 18.—In the Italian Chamber of Deputies yesterday, Signor Deprotis, President of the Council, in reply to the interpellation by Signor Ercole, regarding the disappearance of the Italian steamer, and what steps the Government had taken in the matter of the recaptured facts.

Marriage. LONDON, Jan. 18.—The U. S. ship Constitution is apparently uninjured with no damage to cargo. She will sail in a few days for New York.

Judges of Election Sentenced. BALTIMORE, Jan. 18.—In the United States Circuit Court, Judge Bond presiding, Wm. A. Forewood and Theo. Cook, Judges of election, were sentenced to prison for a term of six months for obstructing the election.

The Custer Massacre Revived. CHICAGO, Jan. 18.—The scout, Girard, in the Reno inquiry, gave a long account of the movements of troops on the day of the Custer massacre and the situation of the battle field, and mentioned various orders given; believed the fighting force of the Indians to have been 3,000 to 3,500, heard several volleys of from fifty to one hundred shots each on the other side of the village about the time the order was given every man to his horse.

Commissioner Love take the testimony of witnesses subpoenaed but not examined; that Norris Marks represent the majority, and B. F. Jones the minority of the committee, and the testimony so taken be forwarded to the chairman of the committee.
