THE WEATHER.

CITY IN BRIEF.

A negro man, Jere Mariott, from St. Mary's township, was yesterday adjudged insane and will to-day be sent to the Goldsboro asylum.

John L. Davis, a Moore county moonshiner, was yesterday brought here and put in jail to await the next term of Federal Court. He is charged with retailing without license.

Three new convicts were yesterday brought to the penitentiary—three from Chowan and one from Alleghany. All of them are for short terms. They were brought in by Sheriff Elliott and Joyner.

Mr. and Mrs. William Smith have issued cards announcing the marriage of their daughter, Roberta Atkinson to Mr. Francis Kerchner Myers, of Charleston, S. C., Tuesday, April the 20th, at a quarter to eleven o'clock in Christ church.

A negro man, Thomas Yates, was brought here yesterday and put in jail on a charge of making threats against his wife—threatening to cut her throat and burn the house. The magistrate bound him over in a \$400 bond to keep the peace, and as he was unable to give it, he was brought here to jail.

Dr. Eugene Daniel has been elected by the Raleigh Commandery, Knights Templar, to preach the sermon at their Easter services on Easter Sunday night at First Presbyterian church. The Knights Templar is one of the higher orders of Masonry. The commandery here has thirty-six members.

In pursuance of an order of court the house and lot of S. J. Freeman, on Salisbury street, was yesterday sold at public auction for partition among the heirs. The property was bid in by Wynne, Ellington & Co., for \$750. As this is much less than the value of property it is not likely that the sale will be confirmed.

Capt. W. B. Kendrick goes to Graham to-day to deliver his lecture there to-night on "The Ups and Downs of Wife Hunting." He goes by invitation of Prof. White, superintendent of the schools there. The proceeds will go for the benefit of Graham Institute library.
