A correspondent of the Raleigh Observer writing from Wadesboro, N. C., under date of 23rd instant, says: "Yesterday evening, about dark, as Mr. Gaston Huntley was going home from town in his wagon, and when he had reached a point about two miles from town, three men ran out from the woods and stopped him. One went to the horse's head, and the others armed, one with a club and the other with a pistol, stopped up to Mr. Huntley and demanded 'the money he had received for the wagon he had sold in town that day.' Mr. Huntley told them 'he had not brought it with him, but that he had some change in his pocket which they might have.' Putting his hand in his pocket, as if to take out the money, he drew his pistol and put it to the head of the man nearest to him and fired. The man threw up his arms and fell. The horse dashed off at the report of the pistol, and as they did so the man with the club struck at Mr. Huntley, and then took a pistol from the man on the ground and fired at him several times. A woman living close by heard the wounded man call to his neighbor to take her out, and some one should come to help him. Mr. Huntley got some friends and went back to the place, but could not find any of the parties. They remained searching for them. It is hoped they will catch them all."
