THE CHICAGO CONVENTION.

It is with feelings of pride and pleasure that we print at the close of this column the names of Cleveland and Hendricks as the democratic candidates for President and Vice President.

The convention of all our first day night, after having been in session exactly the same length of time as was the republican convention in the same building last month.

The first ballot was taken on Thursday night and resulted as follows: Cleveland 332, Bayard 174, Thurston 88, Randall 78, McDougal 56 and Curtis 27.

An adjournment was made until next day when the second ballot was taken and after the result was finished, but before the 13:00 was announced, the North Carolina delegates changed their votes 22 from Bayard to Cleveland and 10 from Virginia, Georgia and other States in rapid succession.
