Plum in the Poultry Yard. Every farmer who has tried it is sure that plums in the poultry yard are preserved from curdles.

It may be valuable says the Rural Californian, to know that a flock of three hundred turkeys kept a large vineyard clear of bugs and worms last season, while in neighboring vineyards not so treated the bugs and worms destroyed the crops.

It is now asserted that the common earth worm is the cause of the gape parasite in chicks. In examining earth worms from a gape-infected district the gape parasite was found to be coiled up in the structure of the earth worm, and upon feeding the chicks with such earth worms the disease was at once produced among the brood.

One of the best remedies for diarrhoea in fowls is as follows: Give a teaspoonful of raw linseed oil, repeating the dose the second day after. Then give one scruple each of powdered Peruvian bark and hypophosphate of soda made into pills with common soap once a day for three or four days.

An English farmer says: For two winters I have placed six horses on the following weekly allowances: Forty-two pounds of oats, 25 pounds of hay, 21 pounds of beans, 21 pounds of hay, 14 pounds of oat straw, 21 into chaff, 50 pounds long hay total, 186 pounds of food per week per horse.
