

Now is the time for the taxpayers of North Carolina to list their taxables. This is required to be done within twenty days after the first Monday in June.

Every person required to list property shall make out and deliver to the town or list maker a statement, verified by his oath, of all the real and personal property, moneys, credits, investments in bonds, stocks, joint stock companies, mortgages, or other wise, in his possession or under his control on the first day of June, either as owner or holder thereof, or as parent, husband, guardian, trustee, executor, administrator, receiver, or consenting officer, partner, agent, law or otherwise.

The list makers are required by law to return their tax lists to the register of deeds on or before the first Monday in July, and the county commissioners must meet on the second Monday in July for the purpose of revising the tax lists and levying the amounts of persons who may object to the valuation assessed upon their property.
