Our Washington Letter.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8, 1886. The situation in the departments here is remarkable. Nothing like it has been seen for at least twenty years.

This is the time of year that Government Star Route contracts are let out. The reader will remember that mail routes, except those by railroad and steam, are called Star Routes from the fact that a star was printed on all mail bags carried by stage coach, horse back or by a footman.

During the last week two Cabinet meetings have been held. The questions discussed related to the surrender of Genomico and to the participation of Federal office holders in obstructive and practical politics.

The Indian wholesale murderer, Genomico, continues to be a serious issue in the Cabinet and unless a band of patriotic lynchers shall put him out of the way, he is likely to cause legal and military embarrassments more trouble to fix his international status than it gave Gen. Miles to capture him.

BIRMINGHAM, Oct. 10.—It is understood in railroad circles, though the fact is not officially stated, that President Garrett of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad company, while in Europe, perfected arrangements for securing the funds necessary for extending the Valley Railroad of Virginia south of Pennsylvania, Fla., and that the work is to be commenced within thirty days.
