A Mysterious Suicide.

Winston, N. C., March 7.—Thirteen miles of Cross Roads Church, Yadkin county, is expected over finding the dead body of Henry Frost lying in a road in the north-eastern corner of Ireland county.

Young Frost's father, J. F. Frost, lives in Davis county. It appears that the young man left home, presumably to see his sweetheart.

A pistol was lying near the dead man's body, apparently he had dropped from his hand.

The coroner's examination found the victim had come to his death by a bullet fired from a pistol in his own hand.

The ball entered the left eye and ranged straight toward the back of the head.

Nothing is known of the shooting, except the report of the pistol. He was a young man, about 20 years old and was sober.

He had \$14 on his person.
