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B. & O.'s New Through Line.

PREPARING FOR THE IMMENSE TRAFFIC INCIDENT TO THE WORLD'S FAIR.

THE management of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad is preparing for an immense business in 1893 while the World's Fair is open in Chicago. The terminals at Chicago are capable of accommodating a much heavier traffic than is now being done...

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James City, North Carolina.

ITS HISTORY, TROOPS ORDERED THERE BY THE GOVERNOR TO ENFORCE THE LAW, ETC.

In 1863 many negro families were removed by "General" James from New Berne to the opposite side of Front river. They put up rude cabins and made themselves thoroughly at home, believing they had been given the land by the United States government...

About ten years ago Mr. James A. Bryan undertook to regain the land, which was and is now his rightful, legal property. James City fought the case through several courts, and finally the Supreme Court decided beyond all dispute that the land on which James City is built is the legal property of Mr. Bryan.

Upon this Mr. Bryan endeavored to come to an amicable settlement with his tenants, but without success; he offered to allow every old man and woman, and every decrepit and feeble person in the village to remain, unmolested and free from rent, but this did not suit the stubborn people. He issued circular after circular, courting peaceful terms.

Some time since the sheriff and posse went from New Berne to James City to evict the negroes under authority of the law. People began to gather from all quarters. Across the street a flag was raised with the union down. This was evidently a signal, for in less than five minutes there assembled on the corner and in the near vicinity at least one thousand negroes, growing and swearing that their blood would be split before they gave up the property.

Hundreds of violent expressions were made by the excited mob, growling and bellowing the time. One man said: "Send Bryan himself over! We'll fix him!" When ever such a speech was made the crowd laughed derisively.

Men and women and children were talking excitedly and fast. The older ones shook their heads and said there would be blood shed. Up to date all attempts at compromise at James City have proved futile. Accordingly in compliance with the requirements of law, and at the urgent request and call of the civil authorities of New Berne and Craven county the Governor in accordance with the power vested in him, has called out the military of the State to enforce the law, and in obedience to his order Adjutant General Cameron, with the First Regiment of Infantry of the North Carolina State Guard, left yesterday, in the noon train for New Berne to render such assistance to the civil authorities as may be found necessary.

General Cotton, commanding the First Brigade, joined Gen. Cameron at Goldsboro with several companies of the Brigade.

WILMINGTON, N. C., April 24. A special to the Star shows that the arrival of a large body of State troops at New Berne today had the desired effect and the negroes at James City announce their willingness to retire peacefully but ask that ejection be made by the civil authorities. It is not thought the use of the military will be necessary.

NEW BERNE, April 25—10:30 p. m.—Gov. Carr and staff went to James City this morning and were met with demonstrations of cordial feeling. The whole population of James City were apparently glad to see him, but the Governor said that he never had a more cordial recognition. A stand was erected for him and profusely decorated with flowers. He made an address, saying that the law must be enforced, and he was going to remain until the matter was fully settled. He urged obedience to law. He said that he would wait until 3 o'clock in hopes of a settlement.

O'Hara later submitted a proposition to Mr. Bryan, which Mr. Bryan assented to, for leases, and the result is to be reported to the Governor at 10 o'clock tonight.

There is every disposition to settle the matter peacefully. [Signed] S. A. ASHE. NEW BERNE, N. C., April 25—11 p. m.—The proposition has been accepted. The negroes agree to take the leases at fifty cents to one dollar a month rent for three years and with leave to move their houses at any time within three years on payment of rent. [Signed] S. A. A Cruel Father. COVINGTON, Va., April 22.—Lotta, the daughter of John Cole, of this city, was found bound to the floor of her room and was released by Officer Kerr. It is said that her father chained her there two weeks ago to prevent her eloping. Her lover complained to the authorities during her father's absence, and Sergeant Kerr was instructed to free her, which he did against the protest of her aunt and mother who were guarding her in her room.

A staple was driven in the floor under the bed to which a trace chain was fastened and the other end locked around the girl's ankle. Great indignation is felt in the community over this inhuman act. John Cole is the proprietor of the Cole House, and his daughter is a beautiful girl of seventeen. Mr. John Hill, near Madison, N. C., committed suicide last Thursday night by hanging himself with a plow line to the joist of his house.
