The fall term of Chatham superior court will begin next Monday and continue two weeks, unless the business is more extensive and there is no chance of moving the court to either the 11th or 12th of October. There are 40 cases on the criminal docket, of which 28 are for failures to file poll tax. On the civil docket are 38 cases. Only nine cases are on the appearance docket.

The presiding judge will be Hon. W. A. Hoke, of Lenoir county, who held our court six years ago and is much pleasantly remembered by all our countrymen who were not here.

Hon. Edward W. Pon, of Johnston county, is the Democratic nominee for Congress in this district. He has been nominated by the 14th district of the convention and has won at Raleigh.

This convention was one of the largest and most spirited held in this district, and we have never known the result of the vote as yet. The nomination of Mr. Pon is a result of their respective friends. The convention met at noon, and with only a recess for supper, was in continuous session and talking nearly all the time until after 1 o'clock that night. Although the friends of every candidate worked most zealously and a rivalry for their favorite and did all they could to secure him, yet everywhere was a good humor and the most harmonious prevail.

The first ballot was as follows: 831 votes for John W. Atwater of Chatham; 693 for Ed. Jenkins of South of Wake; 57 for W. C. Hamner of Randolph; and 1 for W. B. Shaw of Vance. On the 2d ballot the name of Mr. Smith was withdrawn and the name of Mr. Pon was presented and he led on nearly every ballot until nominated, with Mr. Atwater following next. Ballot after ballot was taken without any change in the result.

The proceedings were so uniformly unanimous, but were interrupted by the fact that the enthusiastic friends of the different candidates. The lead lock was finally broken by the withdrawal of Mr. Spruill, and his vote then secured the nomination of Mr. Pon, which was then made unanimous, and all defeated candidates made appropriate speeches, pledging their hearty support to their successful competitor.

Chatham's vote was, unfortunately divided, and six of our thirty-four votes went against Mr. Atwater on every ballot, but on no ballot did he receive less than 25 of Chatham's votes. His main strength was in Wake, and on many ballots he received over half of Wake's votes. Nash gave him more votes on every ballot than he received in any other county in the State. Because each of them had a candidate of their own, brother words he had all the other candidates to fight, and had "the hill" against him. Therefore his large vote for he had many ballots was under the circumstances very complimentary to him and gratifying to his friends. And by a rising and unanimous vote the convention endorsed Mr. Atwater's course in Congress and thanked him for his active efforts in behalf of his constituents.

While regretting the defeat of our candidate, and as he could not be nominated a representative of the State, we feel that the spirit of the convention has been a very gratifying one, and we are sure that the result will be a benefit to the State.

A horse trial is scheduled for today at Cole's mill, in Williams township, which is nothing but political persecution given up by the Fusionists with the hope of preventing the indictment and punishment of the lawless rioters, who broke up the election in that township.

The defendants, who will have a preliminary trial today, are the registrar and poll holders who conducted that election, and were prevented from counting the ballots by the threats and violence of Fusionists. The warrant, on which they have been arrested, alleges:

1. That they refused to deposit the ballots in the boxes.

2. That they refused to count the ballots.

3. That they refused to allow the boxes to be present at the count.

4. That they destroyed the ballots.

We predict that this Fusion attempt at political persecution will prove a boomerang against those by whom and in whose interests it was started.

The Republican Congressional convention was held at Raleigh last Monday and nominated Mr. Jesse A. Gibbs as the candidate to be elected for Congress by Mr. Pon.

This convention was in striking contrast to the Democratic Congressional convention. The former convention was the more bold of its members and strictly obey its orders. It was composed of 11 representatives of whom several were known names and it progressed and its secretary was a negro who acted as a time-keeper, and in addition acted as the time-keeper. One of the delegates said: "I expect to expect to elect our nominees," nor does anybody expect him to do so. He, however, he is allowed by the Republican committee to make the race, he hopes to be rewarded by an appointment from President McKinley, if he is successful.

It is not thought that he will be allowed to make the race, but will be withdrawn in favor of a Southern candidate, who was nominated by the Populist Congressional convention, which met at Raleigh the day after the Populist convention. It is possible that Gibbs will be the candidate of a Presidential election, and Jenkins will be the fusion nominee for Congress, as he was in 1892. It is quite significant that no Presidential election was mentioned by either the Populist or the Republican convention, as well as the fusion convention, and that of each was a case. Jenkins had no opposition for the nomination. Both he and Gibbs declare that they each will remain in the race until the end, but of course they will not. They may now be in earnest, but their minds will be changed for them before the election.

Rockingham Anglo-Saxon: Miss Sarah Bradley, a young lady who has been employed in care of Mr. Morgan's family, near Laurel Hill, was taken to Rockingham on the train Tuesday night. She was violently tossed, and was with great difficulty that she could be managed at all. Her conversation in her sane moments showed plainly that the business routes who have been going about the country preaching the doctrine of sinners perfection and gathering up the leaves and chaff were responsible for her pitiable condition. She told Sheriff Wright that the holy messengers told her that unless she was sanctified she would go to hell. She was very much embarrassed when the sheriff told her that the devil was dead—that Jesus was the devil and he was hung in heaven on Good Friday.
