### MEMORIAL SERVICE.

Under the auspices of the Wm. Davis Chapter of the Daughters of the Confederacy appropriate memorial exercises were held here on last Saturday afternoon, as is customary in this State on every 10th of May.  
The exercises, with Capt. W. I. London as chief marshal, were held in the court room, which had been appropriately decorated with Confederate flags and bunting and pictures of Davis, Lee and other distinguished Confederates. The exercises were opened with prayer by Rev. W. F. Thom, and, after the audience had sung "When the roll is called up yonder," an address was delivered by Mr. H. A. London, in which he related acts of heroism performed by Confederate soldiers that have not been suppressed in any age or country. At the close of the address and the singing of another song the benediction was pronounced by Mr. Thom, and then a long procession visited the village church-yard and dispersed with flowers the graves of all the Confederate soldiers buried there.

### RECORDS OF THE COURT.

**County court adjourned last Saturday at noon on last Saturday and the judge left at that afternoon train for Moore county where he is holding court this week.  
In addition to the criminal cases mentioned in last week's Record, the following criminal cases were disposed of:**  
**State against J. J. Nall,** trespass; verdict guilty; judgment suspended on payment of costs, which were nearly \$10.  
**State against L. H. Alford,** assault; defendant submits and is fined \$20 and costs.  
**State against Clem Smith** carrying concealed weapon; guilty and sentenced to four days.  
**State against John Rowdy** for same; guilty and sentenced to one year in penitentiary.  
**State against Mary McNeill** and Edith Rowan; affray; guilty and judgment suspended on payment of costs.  
**State against John P. Dark** selling whiskey without license; there were two of these cases; defendant submitted and judgment suspended on payment of costs, which were about \$10.  
**State against Rufus Johnson** and Norman Alston; armed with and selling a bottle of whiskey; verdict not guilty.  
**State against Ross Abston** circulating money under false pretenses; guilty and sentenced to two weeks in prison; this sentence, however, was to be struck out if defendant paid, during court, the costs and the money about the balance of this, the defendant (who was on bail) ran away, but was captured Saturday night while executing his bail. The money, having been paid, he is now back home on his bail, but some difficulty existing, and he is now on a little after his bail has been accepted from his bonds and when released to surrender to the sheriff and pay the balance of his bail. After release of the article he is now in the custody of Mr. H. W. Thomas, sheriff, and is to be taken to jail. The money and costs, together with the balance of the prisoner's wife and sister, accused the town and created a little commotion.  
The trial of the cases began Wednesday, and the following were disposed of:  
**G. E. Hines** against **Southern Railway Co.**; damages for loss of a barrel; \$100.00 and costs.  
**J. A. W. Thompson** against **J. E. Griffin**; assault and battery; \$20.00 and costs.  
**Fannie A. Dark** and **J. H. Dark** against **F. C. Day**, executor of Jesse Richardson; verdict and judgment in favor of plaintiff by \$225.00 and costs.  
**J. E. Fox** against **Rosa E. Fox**; action for divorce; verdict and judgment in favor of plaintiff.  
**Rebecca Perry** against **W. B. Dorris**; action for amount in a horse-wagon; verdict and judgment in favor of defendant.  
**James R. Hayes** against **Western Union Telegraph Co.**; action for damages for non-delivery of a telegram; judgment for \$275.00 and costs.  
**J. S. Roberts & Co.** against **J. J. Nall**; action for breach of contract; judgment for \$200.00 and costs.  
**T. J. Atkins** and others against **Board of County Commissioners**; writ of certiorari to prevent defendants from circulating stock law in Oak township. This case attracted more interest than any other and was argued at some length before the judge, who decided in favor of the defendants, holding that their proceedings were according to law and that they had acted in good faith. Plaintiffs gave notice of appeal, which, however, does not create the judge's judgment, and so the matter now stands just as it did the day after the commissioners ordered the stock law to be established. On account of the farmers being now busy in their crops it is probable that nothing further will be done for awhile, and it is hoped that the whole matter will be settled without further litigation.
