GOOD ROADS.

The Great Turnpike.

The proposed New York Chicago highway, while it may be considered a fantastic project by some, says the Journal, continues to attract attention, and there are those who say its completion is assured. In large cities along the proposed route much enthusiasm is expressed. At Chicago, E. C. Donald, President of the Automobile Club, was one of the trustees of the association behind the project, realizing the importance of having good roads for tourists and for the purpose of the association to have the road built as soon as possible and it is stated that the government, recognizing the military importance of such a highway, will lend its support. The conditions vary in relation to the laws governing the building and maintenance of roads that these conditions will be met and remedied. In order to ascertain local conditions two members of the association are going over the line in an automobile. Stops will be made in each town along the proposed road, and plans discussed with the local authorities. From reports received it is possible that not more than 100 miles between New York and Chicago will have to be built because of existing pavements.

Eastward from Chicago to South Bend, Ind., there are good level roads, mostly gravel about 111 miles. From that point eastward there are passable dirt roads to Swanton, about 150 miles. The next 100 miles are not reported, but running into Toledo are 100 miles of level pavement. There are patches of good roads running through Ohio. The road from New York State passes are lacking. The road through the State will start from a point at the Hudson at Kingston and pass to the west of Delhi, then to the north and the west, following the main road as far as it is improved, crossing the Alleghenies of Pennsylvania and reaching Erie, the first point reached in Ohio is Cleveland. Then it is westward to Lake Erie, and thence to Toledo, where it is as previously indicated. Some sentiment is in favor of the proposed highway as reported from many points and it is given by the association to build the road will actually be built. — Randolph N. Y. Herald.

How Egypt is Governed.

The government of Egypt is under the direction of a khedive, the seventh ruler of the dynasty of Mahomet Ali, who was appointed governor of Egypt in 1866 and made himself, in 1881, absolute master of the country by force of arms. The control of the khedive was gradually increased, and in 1877 he was given the privilege of concluding commercial treaties with foreign powers and maintaining armies. From 1872 to 1882 two consuls general—appointed by France and England—had considerable power in directing the affairs of the country, but in 1882, in consequence of a military rebellion, England intervened in behalf of the khedive, and, as this intervention was not joined by France, the joint control was abolished and a despotism set up by the khedive giving to England the right to appoint an English financial advisor, without whose concurrence no financial decision could be taken, and since that time an English officer has cooperated in the direction of financial affairs in Egypt. A number of royal consulative institutions, including a legislative council and general assembly, were created by the khedive in 1882, and the legislative body of that year, which is a consultative body of thirty members, fourteen of whom are nominated by the government, meets once a month to examine the budget, and may propose laws, but can not initiate legislation.
