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ROAD IMPROVEMENTS

The road commissioners met here on Monday and appointed the supervisors of the roads in the different townships. They passed an order requiring every supervisor to make out a true statement in regard to all who are subject to pay the roads in his section and to report to the treasurer. It was also provided that each supervisor shall work with not less than ten hands, unless in cases of emergency. An order was also passed that when the supervisors have hands or teams, they shall be allowed to pay the following rates: \$1.25 a day for man and horse with plow, \$1.75 for two-horse wagon and team, and seven cents a day for a hand. Attention was called to the fact that that part of the road law which allows a supervisor to sue for not doing his duty is now in force.

Every township was divided into sections and a supervisor was appointed in charge of the roads in every section as follows: Abington—Section 1 includes all public roads west of Mudlick, M. Duncanson supervisor. Section 2 includes the Raleigh road and all roads north of that road, J. M. May supervisor. Section 3 includes all roads south of Raleigh and west of Mudlick, R. D. Longmire supervisor.

Baldwin—Section 1, all roads north of J. J. Redwood, between the river and the county line, H. M. Davis supervisor. Section 2, south of Baldwin to town, J. J. Redwood supervisor. Section 3, between the river and the county line, H. M. Davis supervisor.

Chatham—Section 1, including all roads north and west of N. E. J. Taylor, and all roads east of the county line, R. H. Taylor supervisor. Section 2, between the river and the county line, H. M. Davis supervisor. Section 3, between the river and the county line, H. M. Davis supervisor.

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WEEKLY CROP BULLETIN

During the past week local showers occurred over a large portion of the State, which, though not general, caused marked improvement in crop conditions. The showers were particularly distributed, chiefly at the beginning and end of the week, the large amounts falling in the northern counties, while along the Southern border very little precipitation was recorded, and in that section crops are still suffering for lack of moisture. However, there is a large number of the counties the drought was thoroughly broken, and crop prospects though not flattering are more favorable.

While the rainfall was of benefit in bringing up dormant seeds, in supplying the immediate needs of growing plants, and in placing the soil in better condition for cultivation, there was not sufficient rain, except in a few places to thoroughly soak the ground or to soften unimproved land. Hail occurred in several eastern counties on the 24th with some damage to crops. The temperature was moderately above the normal and favorable during the entire week, until Sunday, May 31st, when cool weather with northern winds set in. The sky was more or less cloudy during the week, with no precipitation occurring. Though backward and generally with poor streaks, ground is clean and are now being well cultivated.
