HOW TO MAKE GRAPE JELLY.

Raleigh, August 27.—A recipe in demand now is one for making grape jelly. Mrs. Cornelia C. Morris gives the following recipe which she has found to be very good in her work with the Agricultural Extension Ser-

8 pounds grapes, (one-half under-

pounds water (one quart.) Crush grapes and boil with the water 20 minutes. Strain through cheese cloth and pour juice through a flannel jelly bag. Measure and add form one-half to three-fourths as much as juice. Cook to 224 degrees F. Grapes require less sugar than apples as they contain less pectin which is the jellymaking substance.

Over-cooking and the use of too much sugar cause many failures in jelly-making.
