**GENERAL NEWS BRIEFS.**

**Short Items of Common Interest to All.**

New York—The Imperial hotel at Narragansett Pier, R. I., valued at \$500,000 has been burned.  
San Francisco—Naval foodstuffs stored on Mare Island near here, will be used immediately for shipment to Japan for the earthquake sufferers.  
Washington—Four hundred thousand youngsters—the fall crop of new school children—entered into public schools last week.  
Washington—Reports have been set in motion of late to the effect that a vast number of the negroes who have migrated to the north and west since the war are once more headed south.  
Washington—Responses to the Red Cross appeal to the American people for \$5,000,000 for the relief of earthquake sufferers in Japan was so liberal that the amount was readily raised.  
Philadelphia—Reports from the conference at Harrisburg, between anthracite miners and operators, is to the effect that an agreement has been reached and a two year contract has been signed.  
Washington—Henry Ford has under advisement a request of Secretary of War, Weeks, concurred in by President Coolidge, to modify his offer for the purchase and lease of the government's power and nitrate projects at Muscle Shoals, Ala.

Nashville, Tenn.—Grave concern of southern Methodist Mission Board officials for the safety of workers believed to have been in the stricken Japanese areas was allayed here on receipt of cables reporting the arrival of steamships bearing the workers in the Orient.  
Washington—The national council of the Protestant Episcopal church announced receipt of a cablegram declaring that 17 of its 27 missionaries in the stricken area of Japan were accounted for. Among those not accounted for was Bishop McKim and his staff who were stationed at Tokio.

**SPEED KING MAKING MONEY.**

Ford Motor Company Profits For Four Months Fifty-Four Million.  
New York, Sept. 8.—The Ford Motor Company made profits estimated at \$54,000,000, equal to about \$315 a share on its 172,465 shares of stock, in the four months ended June 30, last according to compilations made from the balance sheet as of that date.  
The period's earnings were at the annual rate of more than \$162,000,000 or about \$945 a share, compared with a net profit of \$119,000,000 or about \$690 a share earned in the year ended February 28 last.  
The profit and loss surplus was on June 30 last, amounted to \$414,129,158, an increase of more than \$54,000,000 over that period last year and \$124,000,000 more than that on June 30, last.  
The Ford Company during August produced 172,000 cars and trucks, compared with 183,735 in July, the decline being attributed to changing over to new models. September's output is expected to be more than 185,000 units.

**GREENSBORO MEN IN A WRECK.**

Narrow Escape From Death in an Automobile Sunday.  
On the sharp turn in the road near the home of Mr. Jim Harris, going in the direction of Siler City, from Pittsboro last Sunday, the car driven by Garland Alderman and W. F. Hayworth, turned over the embankment. They were pinned under the automobile and but for the fact of the soft dirt, both would have been killed.  
It seems that Hayworth and Alderman were making an effort to pass another car in front of them, and the lead car decided to stay ahead and a race began, with the result that the Greensboro boys came too near the bank and the car caved in, turning over a couple of times.  
Hayworth was cut about the head badly, having been pinned under the steering wheel, while Alderman escaped with bruises.  
The car was badly smashed up but was temporarily repaired so that it could be towed into home later in the day.  
Both Alderman and Hayworth are from Greensboro and are said to be most excellent young men. It was not learned who was driving the car in the lead.

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF PITTSBORO, N. C. PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF MUNICIPAL BONDS IN THE SUM OF ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS FOR THE PURPOSE OF PURCHASING A STREET SPRINKLER FOR THE TOWN OF PITTSBORO.**

The Board of Town Commissioners of the Town of Pittsboro, North Carolina, do ordain and enact:  
Section 1.—That pursuant to the provisions of the Public Laws of North Carolina as set out in Sections 2918 to 2969, inclusive, of the Consolidated Statutes of North Carolina, as amended and re-enacted by an act entitled, "An Act to Amend and Re-enact the Municipal Finance Act, Being Sections 2918 to 2961, Consolidated Statutes of North Carolina," as passed and ratified at the Special Session of the General Assembly of North Carolina at the December, 1921, Extra Session, and the amendments thereto, that the Town of Pittsboro, North Carolina, issue and sell its bonds for the purpose of purchasing a Street Sprinkler for the Town of Pittsboro, which is hereby declared to be a necessary expense of the Town of Pittsboro as being a part of the cost and expense of maintaining the streets of the said town.  
Section 2.—That the maximum aggregate principal amount of the said bonds be ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,000.00). All details as to the issuance of the said bonds to be fixed by resolution of the Board of Commissioners of the said Town of Pittsboro, as provided by the said law.  
Section 3.—That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the said bonds shall be annually levied and collected by the proper authorities of the said Town of Pittsboro.  
Section 4.—That a statement of the debt of the Town of Pittsboro has been filed with the Secretary of the Board of Town Commissioners of the said Town of Pittsboro pursuant to the provisions of the said law, and is open to public inspection.  
Section 5.—That the assessed valuation of property as last fixed for municipal taxation by the said Town of Pittsboro as shown by the said statement is \$650,000.00.  
Section 6.—That the amount of the net debt of the said Town of Pittsboro outstanding, authorized or to be authorized, is \$7,300.00.  
Section 7.—That this ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its first publication, unless in the meantime a petition for its submission to the voters of the said Town of Pittsboro is filed under the provisions of the said law, and that in such event it shall take effect when approved by the voters of the said Town of Pittsboro at an election as provided in the said law.  
The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 4th day of June, 1923, and was first published on the 13th day of September, 1923.  
Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty (30) days after its first publication.
