

WHO WILL BE NEXT?

Perhaps it will be interesting to Sunday School workers to know that the Interdenominational Sunday school association is still progressing in Chatham County. At the call of Mr. J. B. Atwater, Bynum, representatives from the various churches in Baldwin Township met at Bynum Methodist Church last Sunday afternoon. After a few introductory remarks by Mr. Atwater, Mr. A. H. Jones, who is county secretary, made an interesting and inspiring talk on the aims of the Interdenominational Sunday School Association, following which the county president discussed the progress of the work since 1920 and emphasized the vast amount of work yet to be done.

After these short talks it was unanimously voted that Baldwin Township join the association and the following officers were elected: President, Mr. J. B. Atwater, Bynum; vice-president, Mr. W. B. Cheek Chapel Hill; secretary, Mrs. J. J. Hackney,

Chapel Hill.

The county officers are endeavoring to get every township that will accept invitations to join the association organized before our next county convention, which will be held next summer. So far five townships, namely Haw River, Bear Creek, Williams, Cape Fear and New Hope, have not organized. We again invite them to join this the greatest organization in existence for the advancement of Sunday School work, and we anxiously await your call for assistance in the organization or in any way we can be of service to you.

Please consider the following facts about the Interdenominational Sunday School Association:

1. The North Carolina Sunday School Association is a co-operative effort of Sunday School workers of the evangelical denominations to extend and improve Sunday School work in North Carolina. It is the only organization in the State which aims to help all departments of every Sunday School and help organize denomi-

national Sunday Schools in every community that has no Sunday School.

2. The organization stands for those interests common to all Sunday School workers. It is a systematic effort of workers from the various denominations to create public sentiment in favor of more and better denominational Sunday Schools. It strives to help by way of suggestion, not by authority; therefore it helps many, it hinders none.

3. It seeks helpful co-operation, not union. Its conventions and institutes discuss methods of work, not church doctrine. All meetings held under the auspices of the Association are free and open to all who will attend.

4. In its work the North Carolina Sunday School Association is interdenominational, for in its conventions and institutes leaders from various denominations take part. But in results it is denominational, for if a worker puts into use the methods discussed in these meetings, he increases the efficiency of his own denominational Sunday School.

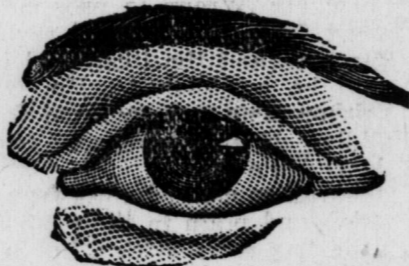
5. In territories where there are no Sunday Schools, the Association does not suggest the organization of union Sunday Schools, but urges the organization of denominational Sunday Schools of the denomination preferred by the people in the community.

6. The Association sells nothing, but is supported by free-will contributions. It furnishes large quantities of free leaflets on better methods of Sunday School work, also maintains a circulating library of books on Sunday school methods for the free use of any Sunday School worker in the State.
