Other cars soon reached the scene and in a short while a crowd of several hundred people gathered. Although the negroes had stated that they heard someone beneath the car exclaim "all right, boys, let's go!" when they attempted to move it, there was some doubt expressed as to there being anyone beneath the machine. However, workers soon partially extinguished the flames and when the car was lifted the still sizzling careass of a man crumpled to the ground. Onlookers stood aghast at the horrible spectacle. Both hands had been eaten off by the flames; the upraised stumps of arms indicated that the victim had attempted even in the throes of death, to shield his face from the It was a question, at first, whether the dead was a white man or negro, his body was so disfigured and mutilated, but a physician soon pronounced him to have been a


