"bobbed hair holders, pipe cleaners, watch chains, ear reamers, shirt sleeves adjusters, Ford repair parts, tooth picks, bachelor buttons, cuff links and toys to use while telephoning." He thinks maybe the Government can save \$5,000 under such a plan.

A newspaper reporter took a roll of congress and found Hoover and Smith leading, but with far less than a sizeable showing in either House. Dr. Friedrich Wilhelm von Pritwitz und Grammon, newly arrived German Ambassador, left his pretty wife at home and went, spatted and silk-hatted, to the White House on his first call. Senator Neely of West Virginia took a political slap at Mr. Mellon by declaring that "an ex-brewer" could never be enthusiastic in dry law enforcement.

In the House, the census committee completed plans for the next census of population. It will be taken in April instead of January, as before, 1920, will cost about \$35,000,000 and will give employment to 8,000 clerks at Washington and 100,000 short-time field enumerators. These figures include the agricultural census, to be taken at the same time, and a new census of distribution, urged by business interests.

Senator Dill, speaking for a tariff on lumber, told the Senate that the suffering lumbermen of the Northwest were sending 5,000 shingles down to congress to remind them of their need. It was suggested that with the shingles on hand President Coolidge could supply the woodshed.
