Short crops are had enough, but there is quite a number of farmers who lost their corn crops last year and this on the river bottom lands, and they are in distressful conditions. Up to October 18 there had been ginned in Chatham county only 626 bales of cotton against 1322 in 1928, and the ginnings in 1928 were hardly half of what they should have been with a good crop opening at the normal date. This crop will be much shorter than any of the short crops of the last six years in Chatham. Five thousand bales would seem at this date to be a liberal estimate of the yield. The last good crop yielded over 11,000 bales, with possibly less acreage than this year's. A general killing frost has been delayed till this date, Monday, November 4. There have been several light frosts and much of the vegetation on some soils has been killed. But on others cotton and corn are still green. The writer has green corn and tomatoes and roast'n ears have been nothing unusual at various homes in the county the past two weeks.

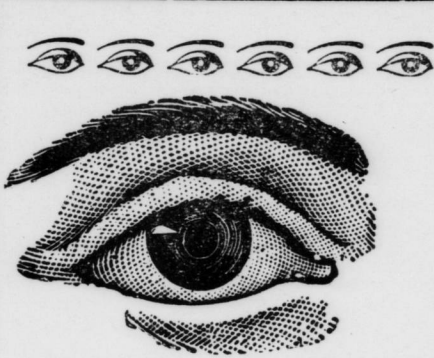
Mr. W. R. Oldham has bought the Bonlee barbership and Mr. Chapin Thomas is operating it.

Mr. Junius Durham left a fine strawberry in the office Wednesday morning with the note that he would give us some more but he had them engaged to sell.



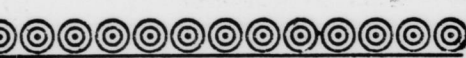
