Crepe Paper "Hanky" Bag

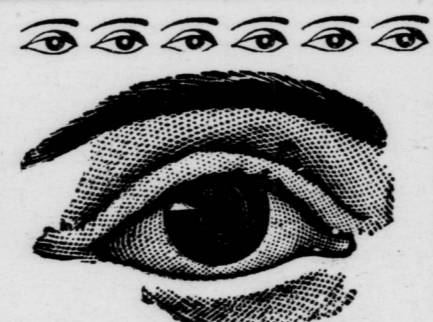
