Chatham is quitting cotton. Ginning up to Dec. 1 were only 4,060 bales, and Mr. M. H. Woody, cotton census man, says that the yield this year is much better than last, but that the cut in acreage is likely to reduce the year's production to that of last year, the lowest in many years.

MORE ABOUT STATE NEWS Starts on Page One

Governor Gardner former Governor Cameron Morrison, who nosed him out of the gubernatorial nomination 10 years ago, to the United States Senate to succeed Senator Overman, deceased.

Senator Morrison, as his first official act, approved the appointment of his neighbor, fellow church and townsman, Frank R. McNinch, head of the anti-Smith group in 1928, as a member of the Federal Power Commission, after calling him a "sorry Democrat."

Senator F. M. Simmons led his successful opponent, Josiah William Bailey, down the Senate aisle and seated him in his seat for a time, meanwhile chatting pleasantly with him.

Senator Simmons presented the credentials and the person of his former friend and recent political arch-enemy, Cameron Morrison, to the United States Senate.

Senator-elect Bailey's opposition to appointment of Mr. McNinch was overridden by the approval given by Senator Morrison, who, although named 10 days ago, will be North Carolina's senior Senator over Mr. Bailey, who was nominated in June and elected in November.

Former Governor Angus W. McLean, previously, renounced his well-known desire for a Senate seat out of loyalty to Senator Simmons, work-campaign, but spoke over radio and otherwise for his successful opponent, Mr. Bailey, who was McLean's unsuccessful opponent for 1924.

Governor Gardner's appointment of Morrison as Senator was undoubtedly a wise political act. For Morrison is popular with a large element, worked and spent money in the counties in the recent campaign and has many followers in the next General Assembly who could at least have annoyed Gardner in his legislative program. Now they will certainly look at it with friendly eyes. Senator Morrison's stand on the McNinch appointment will certainly bring to him a large part of the formerly estranged anti-Smith Simmons element, more in numbers, probably, than will be estranged in the Bailey following. Bailey can ill afford to break with Morrison, his senior in the Senate and his ally in the recent Bailey-Simmons and Bailey-Pritchard campaigns.

"Quite probably there exists today \$500,000,000 of untaxed intangible value in foreign corporations doing business in North Carolina," Attorney General D. G. Brummitt said in an address on "Readjustments in Taxation" before a group of State University students last Friday.

Tracing the changes in conditions in North Carolina from agricultural to largely industrial activities since 1900, Mr. Brummitt held that changes in the taxation methods must follow. While domestic corporations are paying taxes on their intangible assets, the State's taxing system is not prepared to reach it in the so-called foreign corporations and should be modernized, he stated.

"Readjustments in taxation which distribute the burden more evenly will aid in any effort toward agricultural and industrial rehabilitation," he said.

E. B. Jeffress, publisher of the Greensboro Daily News and now also of the Greensboro Recor, is mentioned as a possible candidate for Governor in 1936, taking place with other prospects, including A. H. Graham, Hillsboro; Thomas C. Bowie, Jefferson; Thomas L. Kirkpatrick, Charlotte.

Mr. Jeffress served as mayor of Greensboro and was elected this fall to the 1931 General Assembly from Guilford. Just what attitude his "brethren of the press" will take toward such a candidacy is problematical.

Automobiles killed 102 persons in North Carolina in November, bringing the death toll for the first 11 months of the year to 690, the same number killed in the 12 months of last year. Last month's deaths were four less than the high mark of 106 in December, last year. Thirty-five, or more than one-third of those killed in November were pedestrians, the report of Director Sprangue Silver shows. Drunken drivers were responsible for nine deaths and 24 injured.

The Machinery Act "requires an actual valuation on all property, real as well as personal," and permits no exceptions, Attorney General Brummitt has held in reply to inquiries. Some counties have recently made valuations and want to adopt these as the 1931 quadriennial assessments, or want to make horizontal increases or decreases of former valuations, he said. He points out that the General Assembly, meeting in January, can change the method and make a new plan, however, and suggests that county officials in such counties take up the proposal with their county representatives.

TO THE TAX PAYERS OF CHATHAM COUNTY

I take this medium of sending you greetings and best wishes for a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. I also want to thank those of you who have so graciously cooperated with me, on this my first tax round. I have found that the tax payers of Chatham County are a loyal people and are anxious and willing to support the County Government. To you who have paid your 1930 taxes, let me say that you have done a noble part, and to those who have not yet paid, let me say that you have February 1st, 1931 to pay the 1930 tax without penalty. Let's remember that in order to keep the public schools running and keep the public roads in the present extra ordinary condition, that it will be necessary for the taxes to be paid promptly. The school term is now half out and all who have not yet paid their taxes let me ask that you send your tax notice direct to the undersigned with check or money order to Pittsboro for the amount tax due by you. This will save time and expense to the county. The law only requires the Tax Collector to make one visit to each of the several townships. Let a two cent letter do the work for you.
