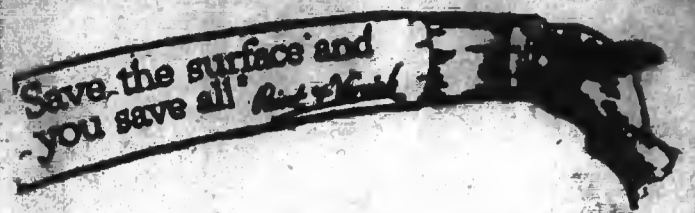
**North Wilkesboro Team To
