**35,000 Men in Tire Factories Given Increases**

Akron, O., June 14.—Wages went up today for thousands who earn their living in the tire and rubber industry.

Four large companies announced 10 per cent increases effective tomorrow or Friday, and a fifth disclosed it had already given its workers a 5 per cent boost.

Goodyear Tire and Rubber company estimated the number of its employees affected at 20,000. The others would not say how many workmen would be the gainers, but an estimate by a reliable authority set the total aside from Goodyear at approximately 15,000.

Besides Goodyear, those announcing 10 per cent increases were the Firestone Tire and Rubber company, the General Tire and Rubber company, and the Mohawk Rubber company. General's raise will be effective tomorrow, the others Friday.

The Seiberling Rubber company announced it had made its pay checks 5 per cent greater on June 5, retro-active to June 1.

While none of the companies indicated how far such increases would go toward making up for the total of reductions made during the past several years the increase was not a full restoration of all previous cuts.

Paul W. Litchfield, president of Goodyear, announced the increase would affect all the company's factories and offices in Akron, Los Angeles and Gadsden, Ala., as well as all operating and distributing personnel in the country.

**Burke Retires; Dunlap Chosen By Ehringhaus**

Raleigh, June 14.—Governor J. O. B. Ehringhaus today announced retirement of Henry Burke, assistant director of the state budget, and the appointment of Frank L. Dunlap, of Wadesboro, as his successor.

Burke, a prominent figure in state politics since 1926, will leave the office July 1 and move to Jacksonville, Fla. The Governor said the assistant director of the budget under three administrations was retiring of his own volition.

Dunlap, state senator from Anson county in 1931, was named personnel director shortly after the 1931 legislature created the position. The recent assembly combined the office with that of assistant director of the budget, leaving Dunlap without a state position.

The new assistant director was chairman of the Senate finance committee during the administration of O. Max Gardner and was recognized as one of the governor's closest political and financial advisers.
