

# All-Star Baseball League Team Selected

## Practice Session Will Be Held At Fairgrounds Here Friday Afternoon

Team Will Play All-Star Watauga League Team In 3-Game Series

### 20 MEN ARE CHOSEN

The selection of an all-star team, composed of 20 players, from the six teams of the Wilkes County Baseball League was announced yesterday by Willard G. Cole and Dwight Nichols, president and secretary of the league respectively.

It was announced that the all-star team will meet an all-star team from the six-team Watauga League in a three-game series at an early date, the first game probably to be played next Thursday, August 31, at the fairgrounds here.

## Florida City Leads In Murders In 1932

Jacksonville Stands At Head Of List In Survey of Cities of More Than 100,000

Chicago, Aug. 21.—Jacksonville, Fla., led the nation in rate of murders per capita during 1932, according to a survey just completed by Frederick Rex, II, librarian for the city of Chicago, while this city, much publicized as the haunt of the gangster, ranked 26th.

Rex made a survey of 35 cities having a population of more than 100,000. His statistics were based upon figures furnished by police reports to the bureau of investigation of the department of justice, and other figures regarded by him as authentic.

The table placed Jacksonville, Fla., at the top of the list for 1932 with 61 murders, a ratio of 43.88 for each 100,000 population. In 1931 the city ranked second with 47 murders and a ratio of 35.87. In 1931, Birmingham, Ala., led.

The following cities reported no murders in 1932:

Fall River, Mass.; Grand Rapids, Mich.; Lowell, Mass.; New Bedford, Mass.; Reading, Pa.; South Bend, Ind., and Utica, N. Y.

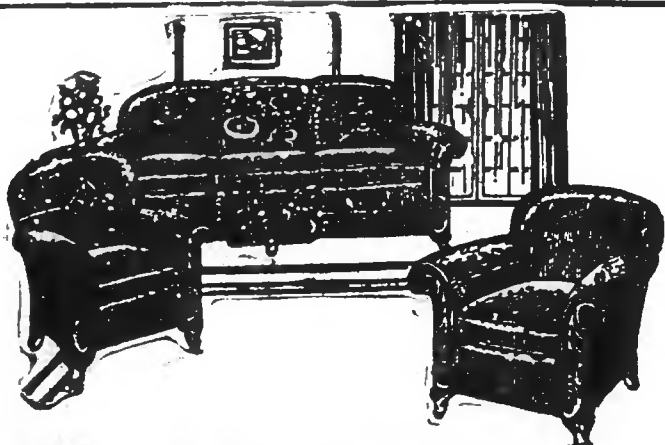

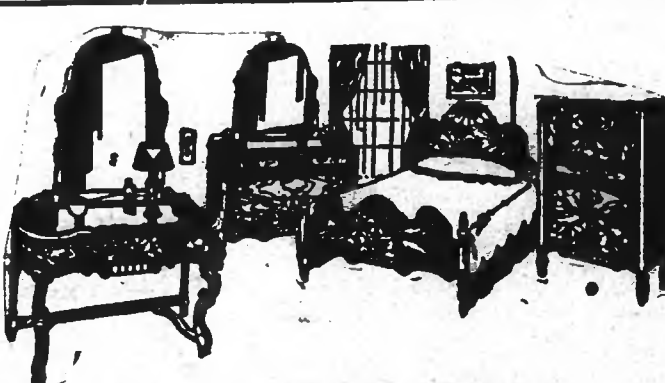
