Superintendent Of The Mills Home Delivers Very Inspiring Address

FINE ANNUAL MEETING

An address by Prof. I. G. Greer, superintendent of Mills Home, Baptist orphanage at Thomasville, featured the annual three-day meeting of the Stone Mountain Association which was held at Bethel church near Hays Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

The Mills Home superintendent delivered an inspiring message to a large audience at the Sunday morning session. Many considered Mr. Greer's address one of the ablest ever heard at an association meeting.

Solicitor Thinks Citizens Group Is Helping Greatly

John R. Jones Says Crime Is On Decrease As Result of Group's Activity

COMMENDS THE PEOPLE
Churches, Schools And Public Generally Interested In Law And Order

In an interview yesterday afternoon, Solicitor John R. Jones expressed the belief that the Wilkes Citizens' Association had helped immensely in curbing the crime wave in Wilkes during the past few weeks.

"In my opinion, law and order are being given more serious consideration now by the general public than at any time in recent years and the association has been instrumental in bringing this about," the solicitor said.

"Our Wilkes county people are to be commended for the efforts they have put forth recently to create a greater respect for the law. Never in my experience in public life have I found a greater interest in bringing about better conditions."

The solicitor stated that if the public interest in the movement against crime continues it will not be necessary to hold four weeks of court to try homicide cases.

"Schools, churches and other organizations have shown a commendable attitude toward the teaching of law observance," Solicitor Jones said. "This is the way to bring about a permanent improvement in the crime situation and I sincerely hope that Wilkes people will continue to stress greater respect for the law in their homes and their public gatherings until we have driven the criminals from our midst."

The solicitor was greatly pleased with the organizations that have been set up in the various townships and expressed a hope that every community organize and continue the war against crime.

ELECTION ILLEGAL?

Plaintiffs Allege Election Not Called And Held In Regular Manner

Efforts to restrain the city from the collection of the ten-cent school tax supplement which was recently voted in a special election will be vigorously opposed by city officials, it was learned on good authority yesterday afternoon.

A temporary restraining order was signed by Judge Wilson Warlick at Boone. A hearing as to whether the order shall be made permanent has been set for Friday, October 6, at which time Judge T. B. Finley will be presiding over the regular term of October civil court for Wilkes county.

Pearson, Ralph Duncan and J. C. Reins, commissioners, and W. P. Kelly, tax collector for the town of North Wilkesboro, and W. B. Somers, sheriff and tax collector of Wilkes county.

Baseball Today

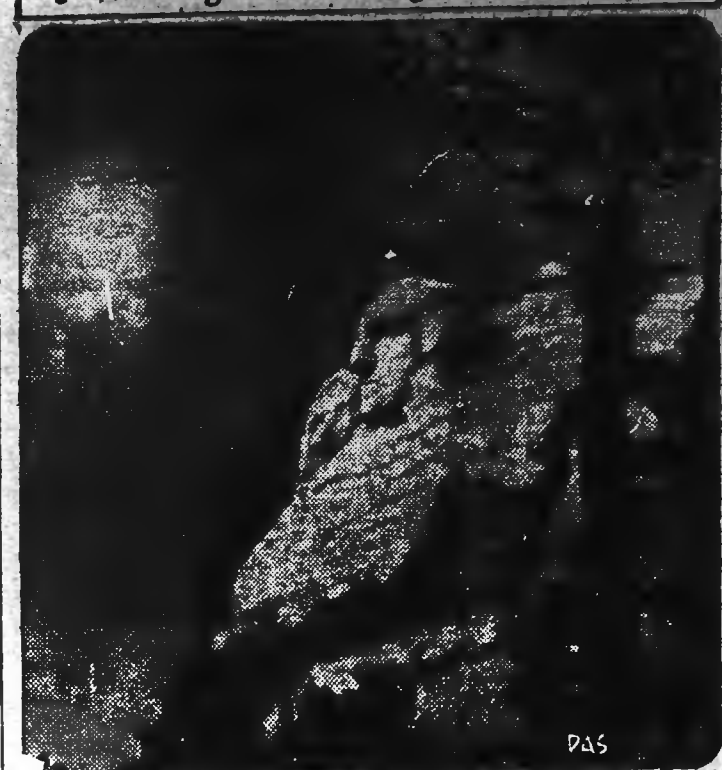
Lions To Play Legion Team At 3:30 This Afternoon

Roaring River Furniture Company Builds Large Addition To Plant

New Two-Story Building, 50 By 85 Feet, Gives Additional Space For Operations; Panel and Veneer Mills Are Installed; New Office Building Is Erected

A program of expansion, enlarging the floor space and increasing the number of employees, has recently been carried out at the Roaring River Furniture company's plant at Roaring River.

The company is now operating under the NRA and is giving employment to between 150 and 160 men.

A new two-story addition to the plant gives much additional space for factory operations. The addition is 50 by 85 feet.

The expansion program has included also the purchase of a

panel mill, a veneer mill and an automatic saw mill. The new equipment greatly facilitates the manufacture of furniture and increases the output considerably.

The office force is now housed in a new office which has just been erected across the street from the factory.

Since the plant was purchased by the original stockholders after being operated under a receivership for about three years, the furniture company has been operating full time and the number of employees has increased from about 60 to 160.
