A fantastic story of being kidnaped and of a daring escape was told by Philmore and Elmore Eller, 14-year-old twin brothers, who returned footsore and weary to the home of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Eller, of Wilkesboro, shortly before midnight Wednesday evening.

The two boys mysteriously disappeared Monday and nothing could be learned of their whereabouts until they straggled in Wednesday evening.

According to the story related by the two boys, they rode to Wilkesboro on the school truck as usual Monday morning and after getting out of the bus, they stood in front of the building for a few minutes. An automobile came along and the man driving the car asked them where he could get some corn, they said. The boys said they told him they could buy corn at Smithey's.
