Local Boy Makes State Frosh Five

Johnny Allen Plays Left Guard Position For Techlets Against Carolina

The following account of the State College-Carolina basketball game will be of interest to citizens of North Wilkesboro. Johnny Allen, son of Mr. and Mrs. K. M. Allen, of this city, played left guard position for the State freshmen. He is a graduate of North Wilkesboro high school. He was second high scorer for the Techlets.

The following account of the game appeared in the Raleigh News and Observer:

After trailing by one point for first-half play, State College freshmen dominated second-half play to get a 34-31 win over Carolina's yearlings in the preliminary of last night's State-Carolina basketball twin bill in Frank Thompson Gymnasium at State. Carolina held a 15-14 lead at the turn.

Led by Albert Crater, Yadkinville youth and former Oak Ridge star, Carolina spread its margin in early play of the second half. Midway of the period, however, the Techlets started getting hot and their passing game clicked to feed the ball to Sam Womble, who dropped them in with frequency. Womble, Jonesboro youth, made eight field goals and four free throws for 20 points and high score honors of the game. All but seven of his points came in the second half.

Allen, North Wilkesboro youth, and Dalrymple, who hails from Jonesboro, also were stars for the Techlets.

While Crater paced the Tar Babies in the second half, they were led in the first half by Ramsey, center. For the full game Crater made a dozen points to top Ramsey by one point.
