thanks for his services as party chairman. Mr. Cowles took the chair and J. B. Williams was made temporary secretary. This organization was made permanent a moment later.

The convention continued in a harmonious vein as the chairman appointed Henry Reynolds, Captain R. E. Walters and P. E. Brown to make out a list of delegates and alternates to the state, congressional, senatorial and judicial conventions.

Harmony continued to reign as J. T. Prevette placed in nomination Mr. Brown to succeed Mr. Casey as chairman of the executive committee. P. W. Eshelman and Buford T. Henderson made seconds to the nomination and the local attorney went in by acclamation.

Mr. Brown responded to a call with a forceful declaration that he expected to serve all the Republican party and a pledge that he will not use his position in behalf of any candidate, any faction or group of voters in the coming primary.

The list of delegates as submitted by the committee on delegates was given unanimous approval. A bitter fight was precipitated, however, when P. E. Brown introduced a resolution to place the convention on record as favoring the re-election of James S. Duncan, of Greensboro, as chairman of the state executive committee and binding the Wilkes delegation to support him as long as his name is before the state convention. Application of the unit rule was also invoked in the resolution.

The resolution immediately put a host of leaders on the floor. Attorney R. C. Jennings gave the resolution a second. Henry Reynolds declared his opposition to the resolution, asking that those who favored sending the delegates uninstructed, be given representation and a voice in the state convention. Attorney B. T. Henderson, J. T. Prevette and Attorney Kyle Hayes followed Mr. Reynolds with an appeal for a voice for the minority. E. F. Blevins, Geo. E. Blevins, D. C. Sebastian, J. R. Henderson and T. S. Bryan came back with appeals for a majority rule and the adoption of the resolution.

A. H. Casey, who had relinquished the chairmanship a short time before, returned to the floor with an appeal for uninstructed representation. The contention of those favoring the resolution was based upon the plea that the Wilkes delegation should speak the sentiments of the voters. On the other hand, Mr. Reynolds contended that the voters who sent uninstructed delegations to the county convention were willing to leave the question of their vote on the state chairmanship in the hands of the delegates.

A vote was taken and it was candles, and ice cream was served by the hostesses at the close of the evening.

learned that 70 delegates had been instructed to vote for Duncan, while 78 delegates had come uninstructed. This furnished the basis of another appeal by the proponents of an uninstructed delegation. They declared that certainly those who had not indicated their preference should have representation on the state delegation.

The fight became more noisy as the convention progressed and there were frequent cries for a vote as the argument continued. Chairman Cowles had to rap for order several times before succeeding in recognizing the speakers.

Mr. Reynolds offered an amendment to allow the pro rata strength of those ignoring no instructions and a vote followed. Lines of the Duncan forces held solidly and Mr. Reynolds' amendment was voted down 114 1-2 to 25 1-2.

Defeated in this important vote, there was little effort to switch the vote on the resolution itself. The resolution carried 88 1-2 to 32 1-2 and the delegation goes to Charlotte Wednesday pledged to support Duncan as a unit. The entire 35 votes will be cast for the present chairman.

The name of Mrs. F. M. Jennings, of Pores Knob, as a member of the state executive committee to succeed Mrs. J. R. Jones, resigned, was placed before the convention by Solicitor John R. Jones. She was elected by acclamation.

Solicitor Jones also nominated J. T. Prevette for re-election as state committeeman. George E. Blevins nominated H. C. Kilby, deputy sheriff and former prohibition officer. The vote which followed was 84 1-2 for Kilby and 25 1-2 for Prevette. Mulberry township's vote, which was not counted in the above figures was split, 6 and 6.

The motion to endorse John R. Jones for solicitor was made by Attorney J. M. Blackburn and carried 128 1-2 to 6 1-2.

B. T. Henderson offered a resolution endorsing an organization to promote the principles of the Republican party among the young people. It received unanimous approval.

T. S. Bryan introduced a resolution of sympathy to the family of the late Ralph G. Bingham, which also received unanimous approval. A resolution thanking A. H. Casey for his services as chairman was introduced by J. M. Brown and carried without a dissenting vote.

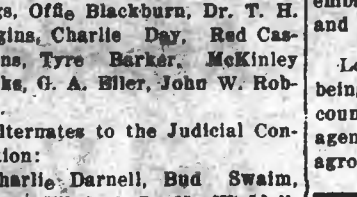
