

No Democrat For Solicitor Filed

Eugene Trivette, C. G. Gilreath and W. H. McElwee Will Not Enter

The Democratic nomination for solicitor in the seventeenth judicial district may go as begging as far as could be learned late yesterday.

With 6 p. m. Saturday as the deadline for filing candidacies for state offices, Democrats have yet to place a man in the field for solicitor.

C. G. Gilreath, of Wilkesboro, and Eugene Trivette and W. H. McElwee, of this city, have been mentioned in connection with the nomination. However, each of them informed the Journal-Patriot representative in interviews this week that they do not expect to file.

So far as could be learned, the other five counties of the district have no prospective candidate. Unless a candidate files before Saturday evening, the Republican nominee will be unopposed in the general election.

No Surprise

The news that Solicitor John E. Jones, of North Wilkesboro, had been renominated by the Republicans of the Seventh Judicial District was no surprise to his friends throughout the State. There was talk of opposition to Mr. Jones, but it amounted to nothing when voting time came.

This is the only Republican judicial district in North Carolina, and Mr. Jones has held the office since he succeeded his law partner, Judge Johnson J. Hayes, who served as solicitor until eight years ago, when he voluntarily retired.

That the Republicans think highly of Solicitor Jones' record was demonstrated by the overwhelming sentiment manifested in favor of his renomination in every county in the district. During his last term Solicitor Jones has figured in many important cases. His Republican constituents who are now rallying to him with such enthusiasm evidently are highly pleased with his vigorous efforts to bring criminals to justice, and with the measure of success he has achieved.

American Nitrate of Soda Statewide Checker Contest Enters Semi-Final Stage

The widespread interest in the statewide checker contest being conducted by the distributors of American nitrate of soda was further increased today by the announcement that the semi-final contests in North Carolina will take place during the week commencing April 16th. The play-off for this district will be held in Charlotte in the Auditorium of the Chamber of Commerce on April 17th at 10 a. m.

This play-off, which is one of six sectional or district tourneys being held throughout the state, will bring together the first and second place winners of the county contests held recently in Polk, Stokes, Rowan, Burke, Rutherford, Alexander, Cabarrus, Catawba, Cleveland, Davie, Rockingham, Randolph, Davidson, Gastonia, Guilford, Forsyth, McDowell, Mecklenburg, Union, Wilkes, Lincoln, Iredell, Henderson, Caldwell, Yadkin and Surry counties. The winner and runner-up will each receive one-half ton of the American-made nitrate of soda which is becoming so popular among the farmers. The winner will also be awarded a handsome silver medal. Each will advance to the State finals at the Sir Walter Hotel in Raleigh on May 5th.
