'DAVY" CROCKETT'S

Another interesting historical point-this time about "Davy Crockett-is being featured in the current Chilean natural Nitrate advertisement which is published in this paper. Crockett's hand to hand fight at the Alamo where he met his death in 1836, is pictured.

That tragic massacre at the Alamo in San Antonio, Tex., occurred just six years after Chilean Nitrate was first used to fertilize Southern crops. The first shipload of Chilean natural Nitrate came to the U. S. 1830-104 years ago. It has been used steadily ever since and has become almost the backbone of successful farming throughout the entire South.

"Davy" Crockett is known for the facts and fables of his marksmanship, for his colorful life, for his many wilderness exploits. But he was also a humorist and philosopher. Someone once criticized his spelling and his grammar. That made "Davy"

"Haw." he answered, "while ritics were learning ther grammar and their spelling, I and Doctor Jackson, L.L.D., were fighting in the wars. We had more important matters to attend to than crossin' t's and dottin' i's and such like small

Raleigh, April 9.-A father's bjections to a courtship of his 30-year-old daughter ended late Sunday. today in the killing of the son of Mrs. Charlotte Story Perkinson, widely known Raleigh newspaper ment at Mt. Olive church Sunwoman, and the suicide of the day. father, W. L. Collins.

Richard Perkinson, Jr., was instantly killed in the Collins home here as he pleaded with the father for his life. A few minutes later, the 61-year-old father killed himself with the same shot gun with which he took the young man's life.
