### "DAVY" CROCKETT'S FIGHT IS PICTURED

Another interesting historical point—this time about "Davy Crockett"—is being featured in the current Chilean natural Nitrate advertisement which is published in this paper. Crockett's hand to hand fight at the Alamo where he met his death in 1836, is pictured.

That tragic massacre at the Alamo in San Antonio, Tex., occurred just six years after Chilean Nitrate was first used to fertilize Southern crops. The first shipment of Chilean natural Nitrate came to the U. S. in 1830—104 years ago. It has been used steadily ever since and has become almost the backbone of successful farming throughout the entire South.

"Davy" Crockett is known for the facts and fables of his marksmanship, for his colorful life, for his many wilderness exploits. But he was also a humorist and a philosopher. Someone once criticized his spelling and his grammar. That made "Davy" laugh.

"Haw," he answered, "while critics were learning their grammar and their spelling, I and Doctor Jackson, L.L.D., were fighting in the wars. We had more important matters to attend to than crossin' t's and dotin' i's and such like small things."

Crockett's spectacular death in the Alamo was exactly the death he desired. Many years before he died he wrote: "Die like a brave man. And I know not whether, in the eyes of the world, a brilliant death is not preferred to an obscure life of rectitude. Most men are remembered as they died, and not as they lived. We gaze with admiration upon the glories of the setting sun, yet scarcely bestow a passing glance upon the noonday splendor."

### Raleigh Man Slays Another, Kills Self

W. L. Collins Shoots Richard Perkins, Jr., Daughter's Suitor, to Death

Raleigh, April 9.—A father's objections to a courtship of his 30-year-old daughter ended late today in the killing of the son of Mrs. Charlotte Story Perkins, widely known Raleigh newspaper woman, and the suicide of the father, W. L. Collins.

Richard Perkins, Jr., 25, was instantly killed in the Collins home here as he pleaded with the father for his life. A few minutes later, the 61-year-old father killed himself with the same shot gun with which he took the young man's life.

Coroner Lawrence M. Waring declared the case was clearly one of murder and suicide and said no inquest will be necessary. Waring said that according to the story gathered by him the tragedy was the direct outcome of Collins' opposition to Perkins' attentions to his daughter, Miss Ethel Collins, 30.

The opposition was brought to a climax by the woman's absence from home Sunday night in company with Perkins, the coroner said. Miss Collins accompanied Perkins on a trip to a farm several miles from here Sunday afternoon.

Their automobile developed motor-trouble that night and the couple did not get into Raleigh until this morning. They went to the home of Perkins' mother in fashionable Hayes-Baton.

The young man drove Miss Collins to her home this afternoon. The double shooting occurred shortly afterwards.

Perkins was shot once through the right breast. Indications were that the gun had been fired at a distance of only about one foot, as the wound was hardly larger than a shot gun shell.

After shooting the young man, Collins walked into the hall of his home, seated himself in a chair and fired a load of shot through his head. He used a short piece of rope, looping it around the trigger of the gun and pulling it with the toe of his shoe.

The load blew away the top and back of his head.

Miss Collins and her mother, Mrs. Margaret Collins, had just arrived on the front porch of their home when Collins was preparing to kill Perkins, they told Coroner Waring.

They said they heard Perkins pleading with Collins not to shoot.

Collins had locked the front and rear doors and Miss Collins and her mother tried vainly to get into the house and prevent the killing, they said.

"I'll kill all of you if you come in here," Miss Collins said she heard her father scream just before shooting Perkins.

Miss Collins, a slender brunette, is a church worker here. Her mother has been employed for several years at the state hospital for the insane and it was through her that Perkins met the daughter around two years ago.

Mrs. Perkins, who is known throughout the state for her writings in newspapers and connections with various organizations, said her son had been pronounced a psychopathic case, but was able to do manual labor and she had found employment for him on a dairy farm near the city.

Mrs. Perkins is also widely known for her work with the society for abolition of capital punishment and as the publicity director for the united dry forces of North Carolina.

The slain man's father, R. S. Perkins, is a travelling representative for a casket company. Brought together at the scene of the tragedy for questioning by Coroner Waring, Miss Collins and her brother, M. Graham Collins, 25, blamed each other for the shootings.

Miss Collins declared in the presence of her brother that he had "talked" about her before their father and attributed the tragedy to this. Graham asserted the shootings resulted from Miss Collins' alleged frequent and unexplained absences from home.

When Coroner Waring asked the brother and sister which undertaker they wished called, Graham turned to his sister and said: "It's up to you. It's your funeral."

Both Miss Collins and her brother wept frequently and at times appeared hysterical.
