## BUTCHERED BODY OF GEORGIAN IS FOUND ON FARM

Valdosta, Ga., Sept. 10.—The butchered body of A. J. Bennett was found on his farm near here late today.

The well-known Valdostan had left home at daybreak this morning, alone in his automobile.

Search started when he failed to return home during the day, revealed the body, literally hacked to pieces, under a tree near the barn on his farm a few miles southwest of Valdosta.

Bennett's slayer apparently had used an axe. Officers were not sure about the weapon and were entirely without clues tonight.

## Rule State Cigarette Taxes Must Be Added NRA Prices

Washington, Sept. 10.—Retailers of cigarettes in states having a state tax must add the full amount of the state tax to the minimum price fixed by the NRA when they sell cigarettes, under a ruling made public today by the NRA. It becomes effective September 17.

The effect of this order will be to provide a uniform competitive base. In other words, brands on which the minimum price amounts to 13 cents a package, two packages for 25 cents, and a carton for \$1.20, the minimum price in a state imposing a stamp tax of 2 cents per package will automatically become 15 cents per package, two

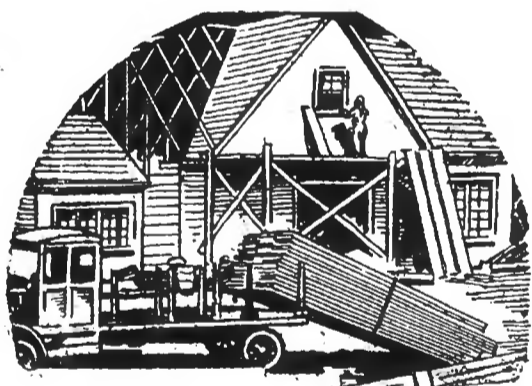

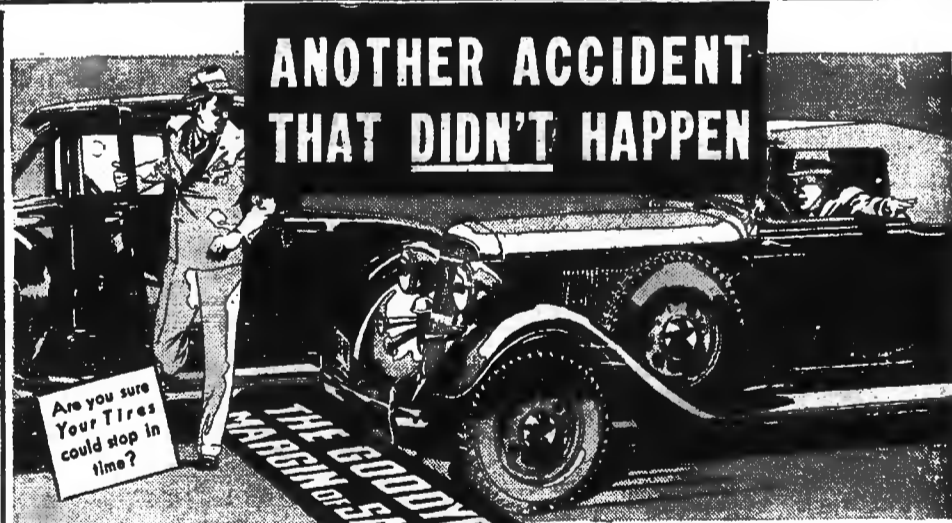
