

Hiddenite Postmaster Found Dead After Renter Beat Him

Taylorsville, Oct. 22.—James Linney, postmaster of Hiddenite, was found dead about five miles north of Hiddenite, near the old Linney farm, about 12 o'clock today. The tenant on the farm, Bill Revis, is being held for a preliminary hearing in connection with the death.

Mr. Linney went to his farm accompanied by George Perkins and Berker Townsend, both of Banner Elk, who were interested in renting the Linney farm. After looking over the farm Mr. Linney was accosted by his renter.

A quarrel started during which Revis knocked Linney down. Turning to Perkins and Townsend, Revis ordered them to leave and both ran immediately seeking help at the home of S. D. Gwaltney, of the Linneyville community.

Dr. Leeper, of Hiddenite, was summoned. Linney's body was found about one mile from the scene of the fight.

Dr. A. M. Edwards, coroner of

Alexander county, made a preliminary examination and found facial bruises and discoloration of the throat.

When questioned Revis told of his fight with Mr. Linney, admitting knocking him down and beating him until he asked for mercy. He stated that after letting Mr. Linney up he walked away down the road.

Mr. Linney, a graduate of Trinity College, was 59 years old. He had lived in Hiddenite a number of years, having taught in the county schools for several years.

He is survived by his widow and two daughters, Mrs. Ralph Dorsett, of Hiddenite, and Miss Ruth Linney, of Roaring River; one brother, Rev. W. E. Linney, of Wilkesboro, and the following sisters, Mrs. T. D. Clendinin and Mrs. C. Mahaffey, of Alexander county; Mrs. C. L. Stephenson, of Hickory; Mrs. Augustus Frye, of Statesville; Mrs. Grace Means, of Clarkton, and Mrs. Cora Walden, of Oklahoma.

Pretty Boy Floyd Is Shot To Death On Farm In Ohio

Cold-blooded Killer Falls Before Hail of Bullets From Federal Men

East Liverpool, Ohio, Oct. 22.—Charles (Pretty Boy) Floyd, one of the most notorious and cold-blooded killers of modern times, was executed late today by federal agents.

He died, as did John Dillinger, as a result of relentless search by operatives of the United States Department of Justice, who shot to kill as soon as they saw the outlaw.

With 14 bullet holes in his back and sides, Floyd lay on a slab in a funeral parlor tonight while hundreds of townspeople, many of whom had served in posses which searched the woods for him for two days, struggled to view the body.

With the killing of Floyd, Melvin Purvis, ace Department of Justice manhunter who brought down Dillinger in Chicago, virtually ended his search for the perpetrators of the union station massacre in Kansas City. Was "Trigger Man"

Floyd, the "trigger man," lay dead. His pal and confederate at Kansas City, Adams Richetti, was guarded in a cell at Wellsville, Ohio. He was caught in a police trap out of which he was unable to shoot his way Saturday.

Pretty Boy's freedom was short-lived. He eluded searchers for 48 hours, but this morning Purvis and his men got a tip that he was in the vicinity of the farm of Mrs. Ellen Conkle, seven miles north of here.

They searched every inch of surrounding woodland, were coming back to the farm house when they saw Floyd about to enter an automobile with Stuart Dykes, brother of Mrs. Conkle, and his wife.

Always ingratiating, Floyd without a show of force, had persuaded Dykes to drive him toward Youngstown, and a few minutes later would have been out of immediate danger.

Recognized by Purvis Purvis recognized the bandit immediately, and with his men started running toward the automobile. Pretty Boy, realizing he was trapped, forced Dykes to drive the automobile behind a corn crib.

Machine guns and revolvers on the "ready," the officers advanced on the little building. Floyd attempted to flee toward the woods. He had an automatic pistol in one hand, but he didn't pause to use it.

Then the federal agents, all dead shots, opened fire and Floyd fell. He was barely conscious by the time agents reached his side, and died a few minutes later.

Officers found a second automatic and about \$120 in cash on his person. His blue serge suit and dark overcoat were riddled by bullets. Blood poured from a dozen wounds. One shot, entering the left side and emerging on the right, apparently caused death.

D. Archie Dick Loses Life As Cars Crash

Rocky Mount, Oct. 22.—David Archie Vick, 44, tobacco auctioneer of this city, succumbed in a local hospital early today and J. S. Pool, said to be a resident of Virginia, is in a serious condition in Tarboro hospital as the result of a collision near Scotland Neck late Sunday.

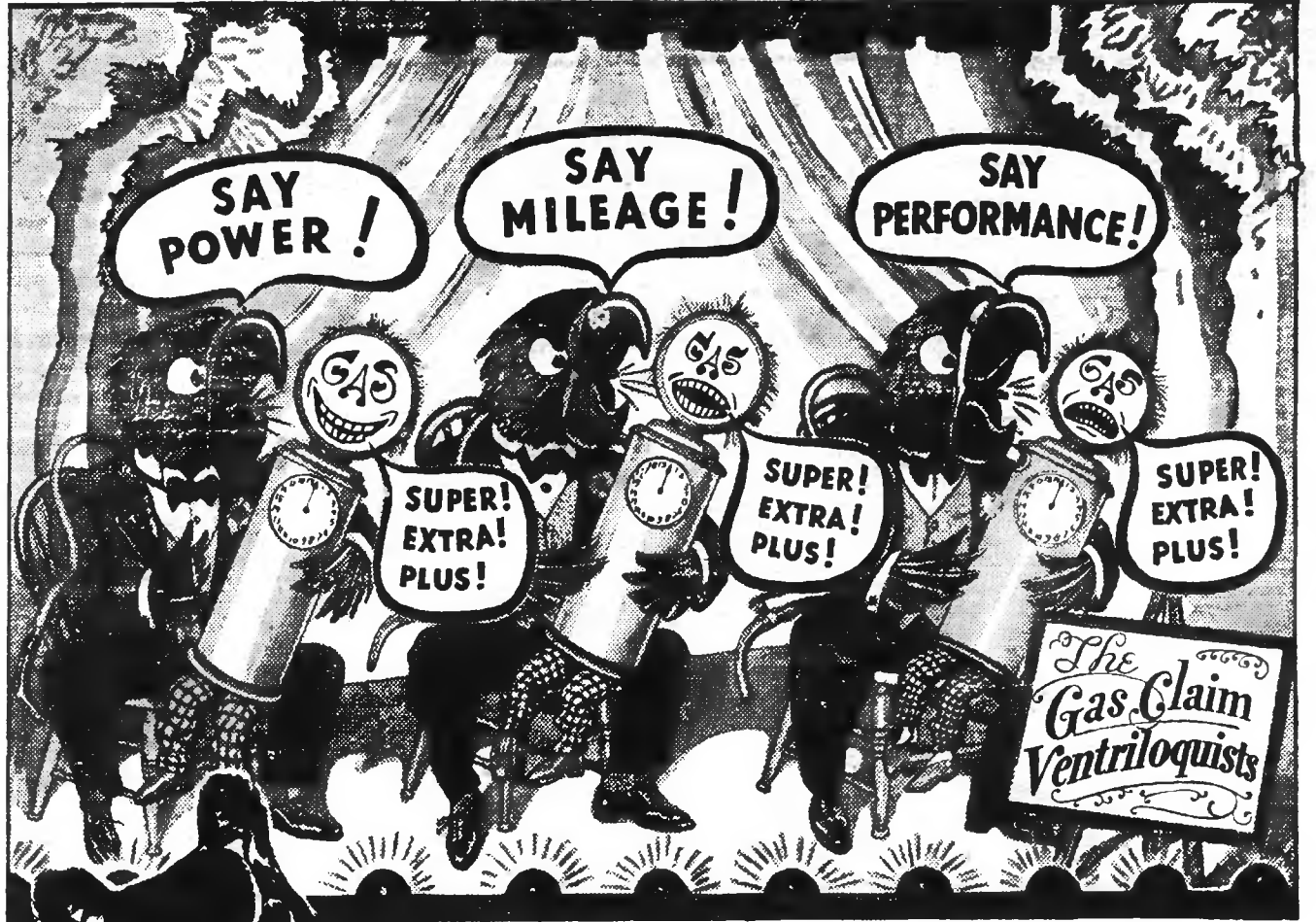
