Elkin Loses Its 'Grand Old Man'

Elkin, Oct. 22 .- In the passing of Thomas Lenoir Gwyn, "grand old man of Elkin," the town last week lost one of its pioneer citisens and one of the oldest surviving Confederate veterans in the state. He would have been **92** years old on November 9.

Grandson of a soldier of the revolution, Mr. Gwyn was born In 1842, the son of Richard and Elizabeth Hunt Gwyn, on their plantation which later furnished the site for the town of Elkin. He was educated at the Van Eaton academy, Jonesville, and was about to enter college at the outbreak of the civil war. He

served with distinction in this conflict and was the last survivor of Company A, second battalfon of North Carolina. His keen memory provided notable reminiscences of that period.


